EDITORIAL



QUEEN ELIZABETH SCHOOL SPEECH DAY, 14-12-1973

THE PRINCIPAL'S SPEECH

Mr. and Mrs. Cheng, ladies, gentlemen, colleagues and students.

First of all let me thank you all, especially the visitors and our honoured guests, for being present here this evening. I know very well that it is not at all easy for most of you to spare the time for occasions such as this, and so do please accept the warm and sincere thanks of the School for the trouble you have taken and for the time you have managed to spare to make this ceremony a pleasant and successful one.

The occasion is made the more pleasurable for me in that we have as our special guests tonight a most distinguished personality and leading educationalist and his lady wife. Both of these guests are very welcome indeed, and, in particular, we look forward to the address and wise advice and comment which I know we can expect from Mr. T.C. Cheng. Mr. Cheng is, as I have said, a leading educationalist and a very well known one. He started off at Queen's College as a teacher in 1939 and after war service, served in the Inspectorate of the Education Department and also as a visiting lecturer at the University of Hong Kong. He later transferred to the Administrative Service in 1954, and held a number of very important assignments in this service, including that of Chief Assistant Secretary for Chinese Affairs. Mr. Cheng also served as Member of the Council, Chinese University of Hong Kong; Deputy Chairman, Convocation University of Hong Kong, and has

held many other posts of heavy responsibility. He is now, of course, as most of you are aware, the President of the United College of the Chinese University.

As I said, I warmly welcome both him and his wife here tonight as our honoured guests. I am also very glad of the fact that Mr. Alfred Ling, the very able President of the Parents-Teachers' Association and members of their Committee are also present. Mr. Ling himself taught in the School for eight very useful years before he left for administrative work in the Education Department. Also very welcome is Dr. Karl Tsoi Kwei-sang, the President of the Old Students' Association and members of the Committee; and very welcome they are too.

I have mentioned the Parents-Teachers' Association. Some schools have such an association in name only; some have none, and some positively dislike the whole idea. As I remark in my Report, copy of which is in your hands, we have an excellent P.T.A. which works whole-heartedly with and for the School. Concrete evidence lies in the very existence of our School Camp with the fairly recent addition of the telephone at a cost of over H.K. \$4,000,—and the recent installation of two drinking fountains in the School at a cost of over \$2,000.—The entire annual recurrent expenses of the Camp at Sai Kung, amounting to several thousands of dollars, are also borne by the P.T.A.

The Queen Elizabeth School Old Students' Association has now matured over the years as the School has now been in existence for nearly twenty years. You will see in the Report the reference to the Re-union Day held in July of this year. This was truly a cooperative concern between the Q.E.S. O.S.A. and the School and raised over H.K. \$20,000.— Already the School has benefitted by the gift of a new automatic duplicating machine at a cost of over H.K. \$5,000 .and the generous donation of nearly \$8,000.-to the Welfare Fund. Now, as you already have a concise copy of the School's Report for the year 1972-73, in Chinese and English, in your hands, I will keep my remarks brief before making way for Mr. T.C. Cheng

I might, however, point out that if you wish to supplement the information in the Report you would be well advised to get hold of a copy of our School Magazine for 1973 and you will obtain a full and much more detailed picture of the School, its life generally, and its manifold activities and facts. It costs \$4.50 and is very good value indeed.

However, even a fairly quick look through the Report itself, can give a clear enough idea of the great variety of extra-curricular activities available to the students of this School, and, by and large, enthusiastically taken up by them. I am highly pleased at the interest and enthusiasm shown by students in fields as diverse as social service, youth service of all kinds, and also games and activities of all kinds. There is, and I think that this is very well known generally in Hong Kong, a very wide spectrum of choice in this School for endeavour and opportunity ranging from the academic to the spiritual and physical. I will not strain your attention by reciting the entire range of subjects, activities, cultural associations, clubs, and so on, available to the students who enter here, but I can say with true conviction that students who pass through this School will certainly have

every opportunity to have their minds stimulated and broadened and their characters and personalities developed, deepened and strengthened. Let me in a brief comment emphasize this by drawing your attention on the one hand to the public examination results in the Report which, I think you will agree, are quite exceptional, and also to the very wide field of awards won and given by the students themselves ranging from prizes in Art to the giving of their blood. I think here I am rather proud of two things. In the last few years the blood donation of students in this School has risen greatly, and although I am stepping outside the actual academic year under review, I think you would like to know that this November, a stunning number of 180 students offered to



donate and 165 actually donated. The second matter concerns one of the main awards of the year. This was the "South China Morning Post Student of the Year Award" which was won by the then Deputy Head Prefect TAM Hin-cheung who is now in first year medical school at the University of Hong Kong. You can see details of this at paragraph 5 in the Report, but suffice it to say the award was based on a combination of academic record, participation in extra-curricular

activities, community service, general demeanour, personality and potential for the future. This, incidentally, was the first year for the award to be offered. The winner, TAM Hin-cheung simply took the opportunities which, as I said earlier, are really there for any student who enters this School to take and enjoy. He came as so many others, as a young child, and left as a well developed intelligent all-rounder, as so very many others do.

I have here to admit, and I do so very readily, that this School does enjoy many advantages. Although we are now, alas, situated in a veritable sea of high rise buildings and noise, we are extraordinarily blessed with plenty of space and extensive school buildings. Those administrators who planned so well and spaciously over twenty years ago would be astounded by the result today. Here we are situated in the heart of Mongkok, and not only do we have plenty of ground space and large classrooms, etc., but even a football pitch the value of which alone must run into many millions of dollars. So we do have the space to enjoy our activities. Then there is the School Camp out at Tsam Chuk Wan in Sai Kung. This camp is in fact quite a substantial affair not merely a matter of tents. It is in regular use the year round by students accompanied by teachers, and here they can get away from the city into the fresh sea and country air and enjoy the comradeship and camp life generally. All this activity develops close understanding and companionship between students themselves and students and teachers, and helps to emphasize the happy feeling in the School which has often been mentioned to me by visitors and others such as student teachers.

In regard to the financial assistance given to the students, I would draw your attention to paragraph 10 of the Report. As you see, the Government supplies by far the greatest amount of relief with 301 students having free places and 182 half-free places, etc. Altogether we find that the very

great majority of students are receiving aid of one kind of another. I would like to make special mention of the Canadian Club of Hong Kong. This Club, through the generosity of its members, has provided fifty full scholarships to the School and the holders of these have formed themselves into a Canadian Scholarship Holders Club. These scholarships are generous to the point of including medical fees for all and book grants for the senior students. I am happy that Mr. J.F. Rowe, President of the Club and his wife are present tonight as well as other members of the Club.

The examination results appear at paragraph 11 of the Report and I will let the results speak for themselves. We haven't put it in the Report but you may be interested to know that our figure this year of 37 entering the University of Hong Kong was the highest so far and a further 8 entered the Chinese University and another 10 entered Universities overseas.

Now all of this, the bustling life of this wellknown school, could not possibly proceed by itself as it were. The School leads a corporate life as a living and breathing entity. It is here that I must give my sincere thanks to those in the School who help in its smooth running and in its creation of a happy atmosphere. My sincere thanks go to all those senior students who have so willingly undertaken heavy responsibilities, which I know have taxed their strength and patience, but who have also gained by realising their capability to solve problems and to understand their own powers of initiative and determination. To the Prefects I give my most sincere thanks, particularly to the Head Prefect and Head Girl, but thanks are also very much due to the Chairmen of the Clubs and Associations, to the Camp Wardens and to all those students, too many to name but whom I know well, and of whose activity and sense of repsonsibility I am deeply aware.

Finally, and very importantly I come to the Staff of this School. If last year was one of the best the School has enjoyed, as I believe it was, it was marred by the death of two staff members. I will not dwell on this point, since their obituaries, most sincerely written, are attached to the Report. Mr. WAN Tack-kwong, the Head Clerk died in October 1972 after a brief illness, and Mrs. Betty LI, the Senior Mistress, in May 1973 after a long illness borne with the coolness and courage for which she was so well known. We also had certain staff changes due to the usual reasons of transfer, etc, but, fortunately, these were comparatively few and we started the new academic year with a complete staff.

I found the rather sudden transfer of the Senior Master, Mr. POON Wai-tong a great loss and I make reference to this at paragraph 15 of the Report. To the Staff who have left the School, I offer my warmest thanks and appreciation and I again repeat the very warm welcome we have already given on previous and more intimate occasions to those who have recently joined the School. We have now a predominately very young, but very enthusiastic and well qualified staff with the important and necessary leavening of a few older and experienced teachers.

As this is my last Speech Day before retirement, I hope the Staff will not be embarrassed if I now speak directly to them on this occasion. I must offer to the Staff the deepest thanks of the graduates, students and myself for your unremitting hard work, your very generous gift of your spare time to the School, your cooperation and your most pleasant manner to me personally and to the students. This is truly, as is well known, a very happy School, and very much of this happy atmosphere is due to your example, efforts and personalities.

I would like to end by thanking most sincerely Mrs. Agnes WONG for her very great help as acting Senior Mistress and later Mrs. FUNG CHOY Yuk-ngan for her great assistance and cooperation as Senior Mistress. I was also deeply indebted to the Senior Master, Mr. POON Waitong, for his excellent cooperation great energy and his deep love and knowledge of the School. All these qualities and wise counsel he brought to my personal support and to the enduring benefit of the School.

It now only remains for me to thank you deeply for your patience in listening to me and I shall shortly call upon Mrs. Cheng to do the honour of presenting the prizes and awards.

SPEECH BY MR. T. C. CHENG



Mr. McNeill, Ladies & Gentlemen, Boys & Girls of Queen Elizabeth School

My wife and I feel greatly honoured to be with you this afternoon on the happy occasion of your Annual Speech Day.

If I may, I would like to start by congratulating your principal for the very enlightening report for the year 1972-73 and by saying to you boys and girls of Q.E.S. how lucky you are in being able to receive your education at Q.E.S.

Your principal very kindly sent me a copy of his report a few days ago, and when I was reading it, I just could not help envying you all the wonderful opportunities and facilities that Q.E.S., through your able principal and devoted teachers, has been able to provide for your all-round development. Not only have you been able to enjoy a good academic training, as your examination results witness, but you have also been able to profit from a great variety of sports, cultural and other activities, such as participation in inter-school sports, tournaments, the Schools Music Festival, Dance Festival and Art Competitions. Above all,

you have been able to develop a keen sense of social service and social responsibility by donating blood and by volunteering your services to the less fortunate, to physically and mentally handicapped children and juvenile delinquents, through your own Junior Red Cross Unit and through your Social Service Team. I sincerely hope that you will be able to maintain these wide and worthy interests not only to your own benefit but also to the general good of the whole community.

When Q.E.S. was founded eighteen years ago, the first principal, Mr. Cheung Wai-fung, was a very close friend and colleague of mine in the Education Department. Ten years ago when Mr. Arthur Hinton was principal of Q.E.S., my wife and I were invited to perform similar duties to today's on the School Speech Day held in October 1963. Thus I am no stranger to Q.E.S. Because of this, I would like to take this opportunity to discuss frankly with you a subject which must be of great concern to many young Chinese in Hong Kong.

We are all aware that the lease of the New Territories will expire in 25 years' time, and many people have been asking what will happen to Hong Kong and its Chinese people when the time comes. This, of course, is open to speculation. In any case, as 25 years is a long time and many changes could take place in the meantime, no one can possibly say for certain what will happen in 1998. Rather than feel frustrated about an uncertain future, I venture to suggest that you may like to consider concentrating your present efforts on nurturing certain basic qualities which are essential to any good citizen of the world-no matter whether he is in a capitalist a socialist or a communist society, By that means, wherever you may be, you will always be a good, useful citizen, able to serve the community or society in

which you live.

It is virtually impossible to list all these basic qualities, but I would like to suggest a few for your consideration and reference.

To be a good, useful citizen, the first thing in my opinion, is that you must acquire an ability, skill or profession by which you can make your own living. It does not matter whether you become a teacher, a clerk, a social worker or a doctor. This implies that you should strive everyday to improve yourselves through continuous learning and through working industriously and intelligently.

In any society, you must learn, of course, to be peace-living and to get on well and live harmoniously with others. This implies that you should develop a good personality and try to respect your fellowmen's rights to live, to work, and to their own views and thoughts; in short to respect the dignity and responsibility of the human individual, and the equality of all mankind, irrespective of race, colour or sex. It also demands that we uphold justice, peace and order, and respect the laws of the society which are made for the common good of all concerned.

As a good and useful citizen, you should try to make contributions to society and to improve it. To do this, you must have certain mental qualities; for example, the ability to think clearly and carefully; to identify problems; to distinguish right and wrong, and to make wise judgments; in other words to have a critical mind and a discerning wisdom.

Finally you must have an honest and upright character, a keen devotion to serving your fellowmen, and the courage to act in the interests of the common good, even though this may demand some personal sacrifice from you.

All these qualities, you can acquire through your academic studies, games and sports; your debates and social work activities in Q.E.S., and I strongly urge you to make the best use of the excellent opportunities and facilities provided in Q.E.S. to build yourselves up as good and useful citizens of the future — wherever you may be.

Before I conclude, I would like to congratulate all those who have been awarded prizes and certificates to-day and wish them a bright, happy and successful future. Those of you who have not managed to win any prizes to-day, I urge you not to be disheartened, but to work even harder. By so doing you will eventually find yourselves on the path of success too.

ACHIEVEMENT

Last year, two students Tam Hin Cheung and Ko Bing Ho won honour for the school by their outstanding achievements in academic work, extracurricular activities and community service.

Tam Hin Cheung, an U6B student, was selected to be the 'Student of the Year' from a number of students nominated from secondary schools in an open competition sponsored by the South China Morning Post in conjunction with the Education Department in July, 1973. The Award was based on a combination of academic record, general behavior, participation in extra-curricular activities, community service, personality and potential for the future. The prizes he received included a free trip round South-East Asia. The following is an article written by Tam Hin Cheung about his feeling on receiving the award.

Every year, a 'primary quality checking examination' is held in Hong Kong. Afterwards the checked 'primary products' are sent to the 'secondary manufacturing factories' for further processing. The process is slow. It takes five years for these to be completed as 'secondary products'. Eventually, the 'secondary products' have to be certified by an important open examination. Then, products with higher qualities may remain for further processing, while others are exported for further processing or go into the 'market'. One particular feature is that all the products follow a fixed sequence of processing. In Hong Kong, there are many schools which can be termed 'factories'.

I am lucky in having been a student in Q.E.S.

It is not a 'factory' but a very good school which give us an all-round education apart from academic work.

There are class, club, house and school activities for students to broaden their mind, to arouse their interests in various fields and to enable them to face all kinds of challenges by which they can improve and exploit their abilities. I, too, benefited from these activities. Through the swimming lessons and by joining the Life Saving Club in F.2, I learned swimming. To my surprise, I was qualified as a life saver that summer holiday. Being a camp warden, I have learned much valuable and practical technique and also the way of organizing activities.

Originally, I participated in these activities merely to find fun in my spare time and to learn something besides book knowledge. Gradually, I found that it was meaningful to test my ability to overcome my weaknesses and to serve others. I entered QES as a shy small boy. I was nervous to speak to a large number of people. However, gradually I was given many chances and very soon, I turned myself able to speak boldly in front of a large crowd. Apart from that, it is worthwhile to be a honorary life guard, to be roasted in the blazing sun in hot summer when performing duties. I might save someone's life! Furthermore, in many occasions, I was in such a position that I had to set good examples to others. Most of all, it was wonderful and rewarding when I knew I had organized a successful performance especially after much hardship.

Sometimes, I could not maintain a balance between academic work and extracurricular activities. However, from experience, I gradually learned to divide my time wisely. I always make an effort to improve myself from my past experience but I have never dreamt of winning anything. In July, 1973, Sing Tao Yat Po organized an European tour for students of secondary and post-secondary schools. Ko Bing Ho, a F. 5 student of our school, was awarded a free trip. The award was based on academic record, general behaviour and participation in extra-curricula activities. In the following article, Ko Bing Ho described his feeling and experience on his trip.

A TASTE OF THE OUTSIDE WORLD

- Something on my European trip -

I would not call it an enjoyable trip—and I am sure none of the other 47 students in our tour will. As I have described in the Jester, our life during the twenty four days was by no means comfortable or easy. Everything was done in a hurry. And you can imagine the fifty people being roasted up over hours and hours inside the coach under the bitter Italian sun as it ran hundreds of miles from one city to another. Putting aside these occasional tortures, anyway, I must say this experience is undoubtedly of special significance to me, and that it is in every way a sweet memory—if I should put it that way.

You may ask, "What did you enjoy most in your trip?" I would never hesitate to give you the answer: the time when I can get away from the group and walk around the cities freely by myself.

I have no special inclination towards introversion, and I am not the least ready to isolate myself from other members of the tour; but the fact is that I like explorations, both physical and intellectual, and from experience I come to realize that one can never get into real contact with a new environment if one tends to remain in his own group. That is why I became so excited when I got permission to go out alone one afternoon in Paris.

That was really an interesting afternoon. I

designed my own way of travelling; I took the underground train myself. There were times when I was being looked at with curiosity, but most part of my exploration was marked with warm and sincere friendliness, though instantaneous as it was. Yes—I did have to ask my way sometimes, and you can imagine my effort of trying to make them understand what I was asking. They just pointed here and there on my map, and then there was exchange of utterances that were riddle to both of us, and then we smiled together, nodded, and walked off waving goodbye. I did not understand—but I enjoyed it.

I wandered along the Seine River, and I walked through the parks. I smiled to some kids who eyed at me with wonder. When I was thirsty I sat down in one of the road-side restaurants and drank one or two pints of beer, and the feeling was wonderful......

But it was not always possible to go out like that. I roamed about in the city of Rome for one night, and I visited some of the great bookshops in London for a lovely morning—and that was all the chances I could pull myself out of the group. At other times we had to go out together and on such occasions I did not experience so much interest and excitement. In fact, I was at the nadir of my zeal when we visited museums and churches. I do have interests at the ancient cultures, but

while many of the members were busily jotting bown the boring facts supplied by the local guides, I just turned my eyes here and there enjoying myself. I hate the practice of jotting notes—even in the classroom. I hated it more when I was meditating amidst the beauties and the wisdom of the ancient times. The lectures given by the guides could in fact be found from any travel handbook: the feeling of being there could not. And if the real purpose of visiting St. Peter's Cathedral is to get a pile of notes recording facts about the sculptures of Michelangelo, I would rather cock my head over an encyclopaedia in the Urban Council Library.

Relationship among the members in the tour was quite good in spite of the fact that we came from various families and educational backgrounds. As I have mentioned, there was tedious and weary time in the coach as we moved from one city to another. During such hours it was the best moment to communicate with one another.

As a matter of fact, there were many experts in our group—experts on various fields of knowledge. For example, someone told me something about modern psychology as well as sociology; another gave me a short discussion on the economic theory of Karl Marx, and there was another fellow who have read the Philosophy of Mathematics and claimed that materialism was an effective thought to conceptualize the theory of limits Whether there were substances in them I dare not say—for such contacts I did have discovered some of my unexploited interests. And from their discussions over various matters I got

at least a glimpse at the wisdom of our university students. From them I could probably determine my future.....

Anyway, I did learn something, and though you may say that I "do not look like one who has been to Europe", as one of my classmates put it, I am

sure that I have really spent an important and meaningful fortnight there; I have at least got a taste of the outside world. I have been looking, I have been feeling, and I have been thinking—what more can I expect?


Besides, our school won the championship in the Interschool History Quiz sponsored by the H.K. History Society.


SPORTS DAY

The 1500 metres race was very popular. 47 competitors took part! Is it a very challenging






event? On the contrary, the event of the 60 metres Hurdles for A-grade girls had the fewest competitors-5 only! Is it not a challenging event?

THE HAPPY CHINESE NEW YEAR DAY




West house:



IS A DICTATORSHIP EVER JUSTIFIABLE?

Look at this argument-

"No dictators have ever succeeded in history, for as we all know the practice of dictatorship immediately implies a restriction on opinions. There has never existed a dictator who can tolerate objections who can suffer criticism, and who is wise enough to consider exotic suggestions seriously. They close their thoughts and finally they are buried under the wheel of History."

To a certain extent this can be treated as the theoretical foundation of the modern revolutions for democracy. Man has discovered the discrepancies of dictatorship; he believes the power of democracy, and he puts his fates into it.

Then we marched into the world of democracy, of freedom and of liberty. But what did we find? Czechoslovakia was predated by its neighbour; civil wars broke out subsequently in China and Vietnam, the states were paralysed by political scandals, assassinations and plots. We have never seen that ideal society we fought for but instead we saw the chaos and inefficiency brought about by democracy.

Thus, isn't it time for us to revise what mistakes we have made in our evaluation of a dictatorship—and what we can do about it?

Man is by no means perfect, and assuming that he is so will only living about hardship and disorder. This any dictatorhsip that claims itself to be secure and complete must finally be destroyed. But how can it be justified? If it accepts opinions like a democratic government does, it will be all right—though you may say dictators are seldom wise enough to do that. Then I would

say to you the key word for a successful dictator will be—tolerance.

There are examples of such dictators—either in Chinese History or in European History—and their outcome is marvellous! I can say this greatest mistake made in the arguments that dictatorship is never justifiable; they never consider the requirements for a dictator.

A great dictator must not narrow his scope of interaction with others, for he needs such interactions to arrive at a correct decision. But he must be firm, he must be forceful enough to make others obey his opinions. These would be the sufficient conditions for a successful dictatorship.

Can it be justified? I don't think I should argue any more, for according to such criteria for a dictatorship there remains nothing to grasp or to describe how unjustifiable dictatorship can be any more. If only a dictator can tolerate objections, if only he can accept criticism—what can he not achieve?

As I have mentioned already, human beings can never be perfect—and a dictator is no exception to this. But it is this imperfecturess or human beings that has brought along the disasters of democracy. Are we going to step on the same pitfall again? A dictator needed not be perfect and if his being imperfect is serious enough to living catastrophe to our society, revolutionary force is always there to replace him with another more efficient one—so why is it not justifiable?

You may like to remind me with the examples of Hitler and Napoleon etc. But we must not overlook one point: both of these dictators arose out of the chaos brought along by democracy, and what is more important—both of them applied the power of dictatorship well to save their nations from the devastations of democracy. Napoleon ruled France after the Reign of Terror, and Hitler centralized the power of Germany at the time when German economy was seriously threatened by western capitalism. They brought glory to their nations—though failure they received in return.

Therefore, for the sake of Honros Sapiens, his glories and his everlasting existence in the universe, I call upon thy nations in the world—let dictators be divine and the commons be ruled. The world can inhabited by any creature but not every creature can have the privilege to control the world—let the geniuses do that!

MY ACQUAINTANCE WITH SF

In 1904, a young man from Luxemburg arrived at the United States. Fascinated by the new field of electronics, he ventured into publishing a magazine devoted to the new science. Unable to keep himself down to the petty pace of actual events, he tried his hand at writing stories so that he might forecast development in science. In 1926, he put forward "The Amazing Stories", the first periodical in the world to be devoted, exclusively, to tales of science. Thus inaugurated what is known to all believers that Age of Science Fiction (SF).

The Luxemburger was Hugo Gernsbeck, known to SF fans as "the Father of Magazine SF". Of course, he was not the first one to write and publish such kind of fiction, Julius Verne and H.G. Wells were two celebrated figures among the ancestors, but it was Gernsbeck who was really responsible for initiating the tide. After "The Amazing Stories", magazine after magazine was put forward: The Magazine of Fantasy and SF, Thrilling Wonder Stories, Astounding SF (now known as the Analog), Galaxy SF, Infinity, SF and many many others. Publishing companies like Gollanze, Conde-Nast, Fantasy House, Galaxy and Nova, are becoming more and more dependent on SF issues as their bread and butter. The number of writers increases, not by the dozen, not by the hundred, but by the thousand. Every year there are young writers who present such brillant works that even the old-timers (not that they are old, but because they have been in the business for years) are outshone. These young stars, with high level education behind them, a revolutionary mind and a brand new style in

writing, are praised by critics. But the old-timers (to quote a few examples: Asimov, Anderson, Harrison, Clark, Heinlein, Silverberg, Pohl, Miller, Russels and van Vogt) are not to be outdone so easily. Their imagination turning to high gear, their reasoning logically constructed, and their styles remaining fresh, they keep their type-writers chattering madly, putting forward masterpieces that can satisfy the thirst of the fans. So hand in hand, the old and the young flourish the literature.

The SF writers perform a balancing act between two gulfs. On one hand, he must preserve a certain likelihood in his narration: on the other, if he only writes about what we expect to happen, we find him dull. Some of them, not as able as the famous ones, tend to overdo one thing or the other. As a result, we, the true SF fans, suffer from labouring over dull narratives, or fantastic nonsense. In most cases, it is the latter that we read with pain. SF is completely different from fantasies. SF bases on exploring the possibilities of the future with a tight, logical and consistent structure that carries a sense of conviction. It is not prophecy, but a prediction. But Lordee me, how accurate the predictions are! Gregor Mendel introduced the idea of genetics and the techniques of statistical analysis into the life sciences forty years before the idea was accepted. Cleve Cartmill described the atom bomb in such details that the FBI descended on J.W. Campbell, the editor who published his story, when the bomb came into practice years later.

People are getting more specific in the field of knowledge. They become uncultured in an exact and technical sense. A person who knows all the plays of Aristophanes and nothing about the Second Saw of Thermodynamic is as uncultured as one who masters quantum dynamics, but thinks von Goyh painted the roof of Sistine Chapel. Needless to say, these extremes do not exist, but there are some good approximations to them. By reading SF constatnly, we will not have this problem. SF is a bridge between the two cultures. It is the kind of literature that is recommended to everyone. Yet very strangely, SF is never the type of literature that attracts the mass. What the writers write scares too many people. It keeps saving that these narrow tight walls of what we know here-and-now are not the furthest extensions of All That's Real And Important. A

deep uneasiness in them is stirred when they read SF. So they abandon it and leave it with terror.

So a true SF fan can hardly find comrades in his living circle. He knows there are people like him, but the whereabout of them he does not know. Whenever he manages to seek acquaintance with fellow SF fans, he seiges it with pleasure. They will discuss the new works of their favourite writers, new ideas like hyperspace drive, existence of the para-Universe and space-time relationship, new hypothesis about the origin of the Universe, of Earth and of Man. There will be white-heat argument, but the pleasure cannot be described in black and white.


the sum of money held tightly in my hands.

Dear Q.E.S. students,

I am presently studying in a Canadian high school. School hour is similar to what you have in Hong Kong. The academic subjects are much the same. However it is a very different thing to be a high school student here.

General behaviour of most students is not desirable. Smoking is a sign of maturity (or rather naivety). Drug is perhaps not too uncommon. Swearing is the way of speaking. Respect for teachers is obsolete. I remember a week ago we had a substitute for geography. The class was so noisy and so rude that the teacher exclaimed, "I couldn't believe that this is a grade twelve class." You know what they said—"You'd better believe it, man."

A scholarship examination is open for grade twelve students who desire to win a two hundred dollar scholarship (in cash). In my school one out of five wishes to take it. There are many tests. But we don't really care much about it. After all it is not such a great thing to be a honour student. (1)

School subjects range from academic to commercial, industrial and domestic subjects. You know what they sing in music class—hit songs. They don't even know who is Chopin. There are many films in class. You don't have to go at lunch time or after school. The syllabus is similar but the approach is very different. You have to rely on yourself. If you don't ask it is taken for granted that you understand.

Extra-curricular activities are well developed. There are a number of clubs, a school band, sports teams and organised cheer leaders. We have pop singers to perform in the auditorium. Sometimes it is free. Sometimes you pay a quarter (2) for it. Sock hops (3) are held in lunch hours. What a strain for their poor stomach!

There are student counsellors to advise you on the choice of subjects and work. However, some of them are not too well-informed. The advice they give to girls is that you should know how to skate and dance so that boys can take you out. Teachers' attitude towards dating is very different. It is regarded as a most natural thing.

The most different thing is the way they hold their assembly. They have it in the auditorium which has the size of a Hong Kong cinema. The school band plays "Oh Canada", the national anthem and you have to stand. It sounds much better than "God Save the Queen" (Is there a grammatical mistake?) While the others pray, I like to look around and usually the principal is doing the same thing. After all this is a secular school. The most surprising thing is that the

principal does not preside over the assembly. The chairman of the student council does. (By the way the chairman is a girl.) So you see how different it is to be a high school student here.

To most Canadian high school students, school

is a place in between holidays. But I prefer to be with you, lucky Q.E.S. students.

It is certainly a great pleasure for me to write something for the school magazine, and I feel that an account on the structure of the student unions, and students' reponse towards activities offered by them will be quite interesting.

The Chinese University of Hongkong is a federal institution in that it comprises the three foundational colleges, namely Chung Chi, New Asia, and United; so is the Chinese University Student Union. Thus one finds four student unions in coexistence, which, together with the various clubs and societies registered under them, offer a wide range of activities supposed to be catering for the diverse tastes of the members. Although the choice is wide (from lectures to

athletics, from debates to various ball games) attendance is often appallingly poor. In fact, I have come across occasions when symposia (non-academic) turned virtually into small-group discussions, and college sports neets proceeded with less than a hundred spectators and competitors.

Such cool response towards extra-curricular activities, fortunately absent in Q.E.S., can be attributed to three reasons in so far as I can see—internal discord between union officials and members, lack of a sense of belonging and active participation, and above all, superfluous freedom that students simply do not know how to exercise meaningfully. AS A STUDENT NURSE

Here are some guides for the general students in Hong Kong Government hospitals.

After appointment, a student nurse must undertake training for three years and during this time, she must remain unmarried in the case of a female student. Theoretical training is arranged in six study blocks for thirty-two weeks. It covers the whole syllabus which includes the following: Anatomy and Physiology, Nursing Art, Personnel and Communal Health, Food and Nutrition, Microbiology, Psychology, Ethics, History of Nursing, Surgery, Anaesthesiology, Operatingtheatre Technique, Social Diseases, Radiotherapy, Pharmacology and Medicine (Diet therapy), First Aid and Emergency Management. In Clinical Experience, all kinds of diseases and their treatment are taught which include Orthopaedics, Paediatrics, Gynaecology, Obstetrics, Ear, Nose, Throat and Eve.

During the study-blocks, there are class dis-

cussions, film shows, hospital visits which help students understand the work of other departments in the hospital, and visits to places of educational interest which coincide with the subjects taught. A student nurse must pass the examination set at the end of each study block before being allowed to proceed to the next study block. For those who fail, two more attempts will be given. After a student has passed the final hospital examination, she is qualified to receive the hospital certificate and hospital badge and to sit for the Hong Kong Nursing Board Examination. After passing this examination, she can be registered as a STATE REGISTERED NURSE.

During training, students are required to live in departmental quarters for which rent is charged; domestic services provided are also charged.

AN INTERVIEW WITH SOME FIRST YEAR MEDICAL STUDENTS

ON HOSTEL LIFE:

Only 20% of the students live in hostels and there is much need of more hostels every now and then.

The five hostels in the University of Hong Kong are just like small communities with different kinds of students come from different schools.

Every hostel has its own activities and inter-

hostel relationship is improved mainly through various competitions.

There are two types of hostels namely residential and non-residential ones. For non-residential members, they can have lunch or dinner at a lower price, take part in hostel activities but they cannot stay overnight. If you are one of the hostel-residents, you only need to wash your own clothes and the rest of the time is left for study

and extra-curricular activities. Cooking and most of the cleaning work are done by someone else.

On life in the Medical Faculty

Just like other faculties in H.K.U., there are 3 terms in each academic year for the medical faculty. However, the medical course lasts for 5 years and is divided into 2 parts: the preclinical and clinical courses.

The subjects in the pre-clinical course include Anatomy, Physiology, and Bio-chemistry. Anatomy includes Histology, Radiology, Embryology, Microbiology and Radiology.

The clinical courses include those subjects such as Pharmacology, Pathology, Microbiology, Surgery and Medicine.

Students have to go to the lecture rooms of Queen Mary Hospital to attend some lectures on a few of the subjects mentioned above.

There are 150 students in a medical class and usually only 30 of them are girls. Most of the boys come from boys' colleges and thus they do not have so much courtesy as those boys from the co-educational schools.

To the medical students, the library is one of the best places to go. However, they are active in sports, music festivals and social gatherings. Medical courses are, on the whole, more lively and interesting than other courses. Students are particularly interested in the dissection of cadavers (corpses) during their first year. There is a large pool for the storage of these cadavers which are said to be clean and free of bacteria.

Normally, all the 150 students crowd themselves in a large dissecting room and they are divided into a number of groups. Each group will carry out the dissection of a particular cadaver and every student is responsible for the dissection of one part of the corpse. Besides, only one cadaver is given to each group and students have to deal with that corpse for one year!

On the difference between Q.E.S. and the Medical Faculty

The method of teaching and learning in the medical faculty is entirely different from that in Q.E.S. In Q.E.S., teachers are not only responsible for imparting knowledge to students but also training their characters. There are normal lessons of great variety ranging from academic to non-academic ones while in the medical faculty, the lecturing system is employed in that lectures are given to the students by professors or lecturers. Students are not expected to attend all the lectures but the practical lessons are compulsory. There is no roll-call in the medical faculty and no ringing of bells to mark the beginning or ending of a lecture.

They are no prefects and students in the medical faculty are given greater degree of freedom than those in Q.E.S. They do not have to wear uniforms and are even allowed to eat and smoke during a lecture.

Furthermore, the relationship among students is not so close and friendly as in Q.E.S. Since there are 150 students in a class, it is difficult for a student to get acquaintance with others.

Although there are plenty of extracurricular activities in the medical faculty as in Q.E.S., students are not keen on them.

Life in Q.E.S. is more enjoyable and pleasant than that in H.K.U.

LIFE IN H.K.P.

Hong Kong Polytechnic is quite a new name to most people in Hong Kong although it is now in the second year of its history. It is formed, or rather as a substitute to the Hunghom Technical College, under the plan of development of polytechnic education in Hong Kong. At present, there are 2 different campuses for the institute, one in Hunghom (former Technical College) and the other in Taikoo Dock Annex, Quarry Bay. This is so arranged because the intake of students is faster than the extension work of the present campus. However, the plan for extension will not be completed in the coming three or four years.

Life in Polytechnic is not so full of variety as I have enjoyed in Q.E.S. This does not mean that the school authority emphasizes only studying. No, we have our Students' Union, under which there are clubs and societies organizing activities for the fellow students. However, not many people seem to have interest in them. There are folk dancing, variety shows, excursions and interdepartmental competitions, but besides those few enthusiastic members, who care to join?

Perhaps I am using the wrong word, but I think the majority of Polytechnic students are indeed, very practical. They put most of their efforts in school work, preparing for the various professional examinations which will give them a better qualification. They lead a very routine life of attending lectures and preparing for examina-

tions throughout the two or three years of their study. As a student from a school that is full of vigour, joy and colour, I really, at first, cannot adjust myself to an entirely different sort of life. However, the hard fact is that you have to concentrate fully in your study, or you will be left far behind. Please do not misunderstand that one will lose one's freedom to enjoy life after becoming a Polytechnic student, or be misled by my feelings that it is a cold and harsh place to be in. But, what this institute is offering are really practical studies that enable its graduates to qualify for work in this competitive industrial and commercial society. To get passes in the professional examinations is the way to it and the target of all students here.

This fact may explain the lack of joy and colour in my present school life. However, I must admit that I begin to appreciate this as it furnishes me with a hope and a desire to achieve better qualifications for my future career. It is much better than idling along one's way of life and do not know what the next step will lead to.

I sincerely hope that every Form 5 and 6 graduate will consider studying the various branches of commerce and industry in the Polytechnic. It is worth your time and effort. Also, I am prepared to give my assistance if you have any queries about entering the institute.

Among the various activities organized by the ssociation during the past year, the Reunion Day, and on July 15, 1973, was of the largest scale.

Association during the past year, the Reunion Day, held on July 15, 1973, was of the largest scale. Under the joint efforts of the School and the Association the Day attracted more than 3,000 people to the fair and the shows despite the No. 3 typhoon signal. As a result, a net amount of \$19,711.40 was raised, of which \$5,310 was used to purchase a duplicating machine to replace the old one in the School Office, \$7,695 was allotted to the School Welfare Fund and the remaining \$6,706.40 was retained by the Association.

In June, 1973, at the request of the School Career Master and Mistress the Association arranged a series of career talks where a number of old students were invited to speak on government jobs, commerce, industry and the professions, and on higher studies, giving information and advice to the senior students of the School. These had been so well attended that similar sessions were conducted again in December.

The Annual Christmas Ball was held on December 25, 1973 at the School Hall and was attended by more than 200 old students and friends.

Also in December, the Association amended its constitution to simplify membership by suspending annual subscriptions. Instead a member is only required to pay \$10 on first registration. It was hoped that this would attract more new members and retain those who had already joined. Students who are leaving school this year are invited to join now by filling in and returning the registration form in the advertisement section of this magazine.

Finally, members of the Executive Committee would like to take this opportunity to thank those who helped in organizing the various events in the past year and hope they will continue their support in the coming year.
