

Mr. and Mrs. Li, distinguished guests, teachers and students of Q.E.S.,

It is, indeed, my greatest pleasure to welcome you all to our annual Speech Day this evening, and, in particular, Mr. Li Fook-kow, Chairman of the Public Service Commission and Mrs. Li.



Mr. Li was a member of the teaching staff when Queen Elizabeth School came into being on 6th September, 1954. His talent for administration, however, was soon discovered and the very next year he was appointed a Cadet Officer. Since then, he has distinguished himself as an administrator and has filled various high-ranking posts in the Government Secretariat. For his outstanding contribution to public services, he was awarded the C.M.G. by Her Majesty, the Queen in 1975. Prior to his retirement in 1980, Mr. Li was the Secretary for Home Affairs. Shortly after his retirement, because of his invaluable administrative expertise, he was appointed by the Governor as the Chairman of the Public Service Commission in October, 1980. Needless to say, Q.E.S. is proud of having a former teacher, who has attained such an eminent position in our community, to address the school on this happy occasion. I, personally, have great admiration for him. Mrs. Li is also a prominent citizen of Hong Kong in her own right. For years, she has devoted much of her valuable time to the Red Cross and has been most actively involved in numerous community services. For her contributions to the Society, Mrs. Li has been appointed a Justice of the Peace and was awarded the M.B.E. by Her Majesty, the Queen.

The school is greatly honoured by their presence this evening and I would like to convey to them our appreciation and thanks for their kind acceptance to address the school and to distribute the certificates and prizes to our pupils at this annual Speech Day ceremony.

As the annual report for the school year 1980-81 has already been distributed to you, I do not intend to go further into the details of what we did last year. However, I am delighted to say that it has been another successful year. On the academic side, despite the fact that a large number of our fifth formers was originally awarded only a three-year place, the Hong Kong Certificate of Education Examination results were very encouraging. Among the 198 Form V candidates who took the Examination, 187 obtained Grade E or above in five subjects. Much credit must go to the teachers who have accepted the challenge so very admirably and to the pupils for their continuous hard work. In the Advanced Level Examination, all our 62 candidates fulfilled the entrance requirements of the University of Hong Kong and 33 were actually admitted, while some others were admitted to the Chinese University, the Polytechnic and universities abroad. In addition to these two public examinations, 211 Form III pupils participated in the Junior Secondary Education Assessment System with the result that 193 were allocated back to this school, and 8 to other schools. Amony those who were not eligible for aided places five were partially-sighted pupils who could not compete favourably with normal candidates.

As far as extracurricular activities are concerned, as in the previous years, our school continued to be very active. We believe that these activities not only help in the development of initiative, in leadership training, in fostering in the pupils a spirit of co-operation, but are also the best way to train the pupils to make good use of their spare time. For example, members of our Junior Red Cross voluntarily gave tuition to the children of Lok Man Tsuen Social Service Centre every

Monday after school. Our Social Service Team was most active in organizing activities for the underprivileged children. In addition, visits were paid to hospitals and refugee camps. Similar activities were organized by members of other interest clubs. We think such activities are beneficial even to those who do not take part because they can have the opportunity to learn something about the needs of the less fortunate and the distressed through the work of the active members.

During the year under review, a number of attempts was made to inculcate moral education in our pupils. A class period of 20 minutes was set aside every Tuesday morning to enable Formteachers and School prefects to give talks, based on a series of ethical themes to their respective classes. These class periods also provided opportunities for the pupils to express their opinions on a common code of moral standards. A series of activities in the form of a seminar or forum was also held with a view to arousing social awareness and to inculcating altruism.

Finally, I would like to express my gratitude to the Parent-Teacher Association led by Mr. Tong Wai-ki and the Old Students Association led by Mr. Kwan Sik-yiu for their continuous support and encouragement to the school. My appreciation also goes to the Canadian Club of Hong Kong, to Mr. Li Kam-yuk and Miss Lee Wai-lan for their generous donations for scholarships. Moreover, I would like to thank, most sincerely, all my staff for their dedication and hard work, and, in particular, Mr. Wah Yam-fook, the Senior Master and Mrs. Elaine Wong, the Senior Mistress for their outstanding performance in administrative duties and their cheerful co-operation. Mr. Wah left us in September on appointment as Principal of Tin Kwong Road Government Secondary School and we wish him every success in his new post.

Before I conclude, I wish to thank you again, ladies and gentlemen, for taking your valuable time off to attend this Speech Day ceremony and for listening to me so patiently.

Academic achievements, though important, contribute only a part of an all-round education. Unfortunately, many parents and students in Hong Kong regard these achievements as the only aim. They have taken this view because they realise that our universities or universities abroad demand good grades for admission and many employers also look closely at examination results. There is therefore a tendency to place a perhaps exaggerated emphasis on academic accomplishments, with the consequential neglect of other equally important aspects of education — such as the acquisition of civic spirit and concern for the community.

Hong Kong has been developing very quickly in all directions and the changing problems we have to face are at times extremely difficult. But the people in Hong Kong have adopted themselves remarkably to these situations and their energy and purpose are apparent everywhere. However, we must not underestimate the difficult problems which we will be facing in the years ahead. With the changing and evolving pattern of our society, we can be certain that these years will witness the emergence of new problems and new challenges, reaching such a degree of sophistication and complication that the demand on our new generation of young people will be increasingly pressing and exacting. Consequently, the mere possession of an educational or even a professional qualification will not by itself be adequate for our young people to play their proper role in our society; they must be fully aware and appreciate the many social and economic problems in Hong Kong.

The future of Hong Kong is in the hands of the younger generation like yourselves and you should realise that this is a heavy responsibility. In order to be capable of shouldering this heavy burden, you must deepen your knowledge and understanding of our community - do find out what our problems are, where help is needed and how you can contribute in serving our community.

Boys and girls of QES are very fortunate in that the education you have received, or are still receiving, lays emphasis not only on acquisition of knowledge and skills but also on other aspects of education. The variety of extracurricular activities are aimed at character development, physical health training and the development of mental capacities. The social services programmes, as described briefly in your school magazine, are designed to help you to obtain knowledge of some of the community problems and to provide you with opportunities to render services to the underprivileged members of our community. In rendering your services to the community, I feel that the emphasis should not be on how much you, as individuals, can benefit from the experience but rather on how much you may use the knowledge you gain from it for the benefit of our community as a whole. Although the Government is implementing a number of ambitious social services programmes, there is still much that the individuals can do. As students, you have a good opportunity to take this step.

But student years are necessarily and regrettably transitory. You should therefore remember that the interests you have developed, particularly your concern for the community, should not stop once you have graduated; but rather your student years should set the pattern for your future community activities. Student years are formative years but, all too often, we notice the keenness and concern of student days give way to life completely centred around job and family, thus resulting in no involvement at all in community affairs in later life. Much will be wasted, I am afraid, if you are concerned and committed only while you are a student. I would urge all of you to try to think of yourself at say the age of forty not simply as a father or mother of two children, holding a well-paid and reasonable job but as active and aware members of our community. It is easy for this to be forgotten but we should always maintain a very real concern for community affairs even though our circumstances may well be comparatively favourable and even though there will be no teachers to give us the occasional push.



Mr. Principal, it only remains for me to congratulate you and your staff on the achievements of the past year, and to give my best wishes to your school as it faces fresh challenges in the coming years.





South means the best - yes, every South House member strives for the best, never halts but goes ahead.



Although we had had plenty of hard work done beforehand, we were pleased to be able to share our happiness with those who were many years our senior. Most of us found the project very rewarding.

# What Do Christians Believe In?

You have perhaps heard of a 'club' called Christian Fellowship in our School. However, you may not know what it is about. And if you were asked what a Christian is, your answer may be as follows: one who believes in Christ. You are right. But, there is much more than this concerning a Christian.

As a Christian and as a student in this School, I am very happy to have this opportunity to tell you something about Christian faith and what our Christian Fellowship is about.

First of all, I would like to clear up a misconception that most people have concerning Christians. Many people think that Christians are those who go regularly to church and observe all the formalities, or those who isolate themselves and lead a pure religious life; or those who believe in some proven-texts. However, in the light of the teachings in the Scripture, this is not the case. What the Scripture says is: if you declare with your lips that Jesus is the Lord and believe in your heart that God had raised Him from the dead, you will be saved. In other words, to become a Christian is to accept Jesus Christ as one's Lord and one's master, not just in words but also in one's heart. This is really a matter of faith. And through this faith, many people in the present day and in the past have gained their new lives and so have we

At this point, I wish to explain a little further.

The centre of the Christian faith is not a theory, a text or a set of rules or formalities to follow, but it is a man called Jesus Christ who had died on the cross and who had risen from the dead. On our Open Day on 12/2/1981, you might have seen the display of the Christian Fellowship, which was about Resurrection. Frank Morris, an atheist and a lawyer in Britain, wanted to disprove Jesus's resurrection so as to give Christianity a heavy blow. He had made a detailed and objective investigation into the issue. However, after a lot of objective and rigorous analyses, and to his own surprise, he found that Jesus had actually risen from the dead. In fact, if you were objective enough and even if you were not a Christian, you can easily accept that Jesus Resurrection is an undeniable fact. Would you still say that believing in Jesus is something blind?

One of the characteristics of Christians is that they always want to gather together — sharing with one another their own experiences in their faith and finding support from other Christians in times of sorrow and difficulties. They pray together and study the Scripture together. In the midst of applause and joy, Dr. Brind and Professor Bhaskar of the University of East Anglia gave the Lower Six students a very informative talk on overseas studies. They had generously offered us a chance to know more about university life in England through the films they brought along. In England now, universities can be classified as follows: first, the two most outstanding ones are Oxford and Cambridge, but it is very unlikely for a Hong Kong student to gain admission; the second type is the universities of London. These include the thirty colleges in London; the third type is those red-brick universities which were long established; and the fourth one, as well as the most recent one, is the new universities, among which, University of East Anglia is a typical example.

It is not uncommon that many people are thwarted by the high cost of studying abroad, notwithstanding the many advantages that studying abroad brings us. In fact, it can help us become more mature and independent, obtain a wider scope of view, and most apparently, we can benefit more from the better facilities provided by the schools. Moreover, in about five years' time, the fees in England will be approximately equivalent to those in U.S. and Australia, but the educational system in Hong Kong resembles more to that in England. Therefore, England is actually a very suitable place for us to further our studies if we agree that the chance for tertiary education in Hong Kong is so limited.

# May Not Be True

It is generally presumed that 'truth' can withstand all kinds of challenge and attack, and still remains the truth. Unfortunately it is not the case. 'Truth' is often based on the appeal more to emotion than to reason; and the truth today may turn out to be untrue in the future.

In the scientific field, everything is based on reason, evidence and facts, yet even so theories are being daily renewed or even denied with the advance of technology and widening of the scientific horizon. In the eighteenth century, it was 'true' that the earth was square; now it is not.

More often 'truth' is shattered into pieces not only because of acquisition of the authenticity through the process of exploring the mystery of universe but also due to the fact that things become 'true' or 'untrue' owing to the change of belief. A communist may take Karl Marx as the truth but if he becomes a Christian, he knows that Jesus is.

Therefore what is 'truth' relies heavily on the individual recognition, and therefore is subjected to external influence. This is readily exploited by the few who realize it and know how to take advantage of it. Some remarkable examples of these people are politicians. It is said that Hitler, throughout his life, told a hundred thousand lies; Mao Tse-tung a million and Brezhnev, up to now,



ten million. Krushchev once said that if words were repeated often enough they would be accepted as the truth.

In recent years the Soviet Union and the United States have started a 'war of truth'. The Soviets have a special agency for publicity and propagation of the 'truth'. Through mass media such as the radio, newspaper and forged documents, the Soviet Union indoctrinates the Russians and the Eastern Europeans with the belief that only Russia is the real friend of the poor countries and the US is the aggressor threatening world peace. In Russia, listening to the American broadcasting, which is in fact often interfered by the state, is forbidden, yet it is an important daily activity of many Russian intellectuals. However, this only prompts the Soviet agency to strengthen their attacks on the Americans. Whenever assassinations and political upheavals occurred in any place of the world, the Soviet accuses the US government of being the conspirator. Recently the Russians have 'revealed' an American plan of sacrificing the old, in the event of a nuclear war, and thus saving necessary provisions - this may partly account for the great number of aged people taking part in the anti-nuclear movement.

While greatly annoyed by the Russian propaganda, the CIA cannot make counter-attacks with equal efficiency and effectiveness. Paradoxically, their major handicap is the belief in 'truth' of the Americans. The American mass media refuse to operate with the state and denounce any government instructions. They often cite the words of the Russian leaders, even though the words may be disadvantageous to their country.

In view of the immense power of influence and persuasion of the Soviet agency, the US government has determined to take active measure. A special committee has been established to listen to Russian broadcasting and make due response.

Nevertheless, the influence of the Soviet propaganda can hardly be resisted. Many Eastern Europeans really believe that only Russia is their friend and will disinterestedly help the progress and development of their countries.

Such belief may sound ridiculous. Yet it is the natural outcome of the repeated propagation of the Soviet 'truth'. In fact, a great weakness of man is that he tends to forget the past, altogether with the lessons he has learned, and be influenced by the newly confronted issues. Even in our daily lives the same process works.

Every day we are bombarded by propaganda; in this case commercial instead of political. Even if at the beginning we deny what is said about a certain product, it remains in our subconscience; then gradually we accept it. Continuous propaganda confirms an acceptance and ultimately we take the publicity as the truth. Therefore despite the report of the Consumers' Council, we still believe to a certain extent that certain tonic drinks can improve our physique; or we believe that a certain article is really the symbol of success — because we watch all these on the television daily.

Sometimes the truth may be concealed by

our own emotion. We simply refuse to believe something undesirable. Our subconscience works so that the intolerable elements are rejected and an acceptable illusion is created. However, such 'truth' is short-lived to the extreme. This also applies to prejudice. When we detest a person, his beneficence will become malignancy and the truth he tells will become a lie or even poison.

Hence it is extremely difficult to exercise our power of judgement to the full, since it is being undermined incessantly by both external and internal forces. In fact, there is no absolute definition of 'truth' and the term may assume different meanings according to individuals. Only in exceptional cases 'truth' stands firmly and lastingly. For one thousand nine hundred and eighty-two years Christianity still appeals to many people as the truth; yet truth of the Bible is still not immune against distortion, misunderstanding and heresy.

Therefore what appears to be the truth may not be true; on the other hand the truth is still the truth even though it is doubted, disbelieved or attacked. It leaves for individuals to seek, find and to judge.

The Hare





# The Swans




Michael looked at Billy miserably.



If you have been in Q.E.S. about 22 years ago, surely you can remember the small hill beside the football field — a small garden and a heaven for leisurely after-lunch chatting. Last year, the government decided to pull down the building on the site where our small garden had once stood. The building was found to have been built with poor material. When it was learned that there was no short-term plan about the use of the land, we students, responded quickly and sent an impressive letter to the Education Department. 












































圖二:每月收入統計


