## Mr. TONG Kwok-keung

Our Guests of Honour, Mr. Henry TONG Sau-chai and Mrs. TONG, distinguished guests, parents, old students, staff and students of Queen Elizabeth School,
It gives me great pleasure to welcome you to our Annual Speech Day. Your presence accords invaluable support and encouragement to the school, our graduates and prize winners. To everyone here, I would like to express my heartfelt gratitude. We are highly privileged to have Mr. Henry TONG Sau-chai, distinguished alumnus of QES and Chairman of Pok Oi Hospital, as our Guest of Honour and Mrs. TONG to present the scholarships and prizes to the recipients.
Mr. Henry TONG is a member of the 86FA. Having completed Form 5 at OES in 1986, he went to the state of Michigan in the United States of America for his 12th Grade, and then enrolled at the University of Michigan for his undergraduate studies in Business Administration. He graduated with high distinction, and returned to Hong Kong in 1991. Since then, he has worked in his family business Wong Hau Plastic Works, which is a leading toy manufacturer and exporter in Hong Kong and China. He is now the Executive Vice President of the Wong Hau Group of Companies.
Mr. TONG's extended family is a great supporter of OES. Mr. TONG is one of the over ten members in the TONG's extended family who have graduated from QES. Influenced by his father, Dr. TONG Wai-ki who is a member of QES's 58FA and a philanthropist and educator, Mr. TONG is actively engaged in education and social service. He currently serves either as the school manager or the member of various school sponsoring bodies covering 34 secondary schools, primary schools and kindergartens in Hong Kong. In addition to helping with school management and school development in Hong Kong, Mr. TONG and his extended family have helped to build over 50 schools all over China to promote the education for children who live in the impoverished rural areas.
Mr. TONG devotedly participates in the work of various Non-Government Organizations (NGOs). He is currently the Chairman of Queen Elizabeth School Old Students' Association, the Chairman of Pok Di Hospital, the Executive Director of the Yuen Yuen Institute, the Council Member of the Hong Kong

Institute of Education and a Committee Member of the Education Bureau's Committee on Home School Cooperation. Through his service in QESOSA, Mr. TONG has enthusiastically reciprocated his alma mater in the past few years such as helping to organize the QES Golden Jubilee Celebration, the QES $55^{n h}$ Anniversary Celebration, the Alumni Mentorship Programme and the School Camp Anniversary Celebration.
With outstanding accomplishments in career development and social service, Mr. TONG is an exemplary alumnus for us to emulate. Later this afternoon, Mr. TONG will deliver a speech sharing with us his wisdom.
Ladies and gentlemen, I am going to deliver the School Report for the school year 2010-2011. As copies of the School Report have already been distributed to you, I would just highlight a few salient points to pay tribute to those involved.
The school year 2010-11 was the second year of the 3 -year School Development Plan (2009-2012). With reference to our findings through the School Self Evaluation Exercise conducted after its first year of implementation, the school drew up the Annual School Plans. The three School Major Concerns were basically the same as those in the first year to maintain the momentum and to sustain the effort made, with minor adjustments made to the implementation strategies.
The first Area of Major Concern is to fine-tune the teaching and learning strategies adopted for smooth and successful implementation of the New Senior Secondary Curriculum. Subject departments were conscientious about the need. Arrangements were made for teachers to attend professional development courses organized by the EDB, the HKEAA and the tertiary institutes, to equip them with knowledge to teach the subject curriculum as well as to prepare students well for the HKDSE. The focus of the year was on School-Based Assessment and Assessment for Learning. Sharing of teaching resources and good practice was widely practised at both formal subject panel meetings and informal exchanges. Inhouse Staff Development Day was arranged with focus on What Makes a Lesson Effective. Joint effort was made by the PSHE subject departments and

the English Department in enhancing students' mastery of the language skills needed in studying the subjects. Crosssubject learning and teaching activities were initiated and the result was pleasing. The School Self Evaluative culture, promoted through the practice of the PIE model (Planning, Implementation and Evaluation), was well formed. An enhanced teaching and Iearning performance was seen, as all subject departments had adopted and practised the CPR model (Collaborative Lesson Preparation, Peer Lesson Observation and Review, Reflect and Development). At lesson observation, teachers were seen to have facilitated greater interaction among the class through enhanced techniques in questioning, peer discussion and presentation. Subject Departments were seen making more meaning of the data-driven analysis with followup action planning drawn up. To develop the capacity of the LS teachers, the school participated actively in the EDB SBSS School Professional Development Programme and the Joint GSS LS Teachers Network. Our teachers grew in confidence in embracing the challenges that accompany with the implementation of the NSS Curriculum.
The second Area of Major Concern is to unleash students' potential for achieving excellence in their pursuit of knowledge. Twenty strategies were suggested by the school administration. The subject departments as well as the functional teams enthusiastically adopted those aligned with their subject teaching objectives or their committee roles. Emphasis was placed on four strategies namely: To promote the Reading and Learning culture at subject level, to make students take charge of their learning, to provide students with opportunities to share their achievements in learning and to promote high order thinking among students. We saw the library becoming more popular among students and the majority of subject departments making appropriate arrangements to promote reading to learn with sharing sessions organized. Students were observed to have done home reading in preparation for class and extended reading to enrich their knowledge.

We also saw a wider use of display boards, class presentation, display of students' good work and sharing to raise the confidence and self esteem of students. Opportunities were both created and seized for students to participate in school competitions as well as external competitions and to shine. There was an increase in the number of awards won. Details of which were outlined in the School Report. An increased amount of funds was injected into the sustainable development of more than ten Special Learning Programmes including the school orchestra, ensembles, music instrumental classes, team sports, drama, dance, debating and cultural visits. To celebrate their learning, we encouraged students to participate in activities such as the Hong Kong Schools Speech and Music Festival, the Hong Kong Schools Sports Federation Competitions, Forums, Music Week, and competitions such as the Mathematics Competitions, Physics Competitions and the Inter-GSS English Debating Competitions. To provide students with opportunities to exercise their planning and organization skills, we empowered students to organize major activities such as the Open Days, the Inter-house Competitions and to assist with various major school functions. Remedial and enhancement programmes, manned by academicallybrilliant alumni, were organized for students during term time and school holidays. For exceptionally gifted students, we nominated them for participation in Support Programmes for the Exceptionally Gifted Students organized by the Curriculum Development Institute of the Education Bureau. They included the Leadership Enhancement Programme, the Mathematics Enhancement Programme, the Sciences Enhancement Programme and the Humanities Subject Enhancement Programme. Teachers adopted various strategies to promote self-directed learning, high order thinking, peer learning and healthy competition in class and students' confidence in learning grew. The completion of the refurbishment work of the annex, formerly the Mongkok Dental Clinic, provided the school with valuable space for the organization of learning and teaching activities for students.
The third Area of Major Concern is to foster among students a set of core and sustainable values and attributes conducive to their whole person development. Our aims were to instill in our students positive attitude, correct values and the QES spirit, to encourage them to manifest the school motto in their endeavors and to promote the school ethos. Guided by the school mission, we planned a

diversified
student support programme for students. Joint effort was promoted among the Pastoral Care Functional Teams inclusive of the Counseling and Guidance Committee, the Discipline Committee, the Sex and Health Education Committee, the Civic Education Committee, the School Social Worker and the Health Department in launching the Day 4 Student Development Programme focused on healthy living, civic, moral and environmental education. It took the form of class periods, talks, workshops, inter-class competitions and community service. Coordination was effectively done by the school to address students' development needs and whole person development. Synergy was resulted. The Generic Skills Programme and the New Dynamics in Youth Development Programme were launched during class time for Junior Form students and the Leadership and Life Skills Training Sessions were organized for the Senior Form students. To promote students' sense of responsibility, the 'One Student, One Job' Service Programme was launched at class level. Extra-curricular activities and co-curricular activities were organized to provide students with opportunities and to develop their potential. The School Camp Warden Training Programme provided students with opportunities to manage the school camp site and to serve their fellow students. The Big Brothers and Sisters' Scheme, the Prefect Body and the Student Union provided students with opportunities to serve their fellow school mates and to create a caring atmosphere and a strong sense of belonging to the school. The Alumni-Mentorship Programme jointly launched by the QES Old Students Association and Further Studies and Careers Guidance Committee provided a platform for old students to reciprocate the school and help students make informed choices for their future academic pursuits and careers paths. Distinguished old students were invited to address the school on major school functions and meetings. Workshops were conducted and training sessions were arranged for students prior to their being assigned to do community service at elderly homes run by the Pok Oi Hospital, our sisters school - Kai Oi School and other charitable functions. A very caring, pleasant and family-like atmosphere was created on the campus for students. The school administration also contributed its effort through addresses at school assemblies. Students were often reminded to aim high, balance work and play, exert continuous effort and strive for excellence. Students enjoyed schooling, grew in their sense of belonging to the school and
became more community-spirited. They took pride in their school, manifested the school motto 'Prepare yourself that you may serve' in their deeds, and behaved very well.
At the year end review, the school deemed it appropriate to sustain the effort made in the previous two school years and maintain the momentum with appropriate adjustments made to the implementation strategies to enhance effectiveness.
The School underwent an External School Review on 8, $10-12$ and 17 November 2010 during which the ESR Team evaluated the school performance in school self evaluation and various domains. To understand the situation of the school, the ESR Team scrutinized school documents and data, observed lessons taught by teachers, observed school activities, facilitated meetings and interviews with school stake-holders and shadowed students. Based on the information collected, the ESR Team made corporate judgment. It was gratifying to note that the Team appreciated the concerted effort made by the various stakeholders inclusive of the School Management Committee, parents, alumni, school administration, teachers and the community and ascertained the direction the school administration had been heading towards preparing students for realization of school goals outlined on the school mission statement. We were positive towards the comments made by the ESR Team. In the second term, we started drawing up action plans geared to the following objectives: (a) to enhance expectation of students, to enrich teaching strategies as well as to create opportunities to bring out students' potential, and (b) to enrich professional development programme to prepare teachers for change.

In the 2011 Hong Kong Advanced Level Examination, we entered 80 students and they scored altogether 141 distinctions and credits. There was a marked improvement in the A - C grade percentage recorded as compared with the results of $2010.86 .25 \%$ of our students met the minimum entrance requirements for tertiary education. The high achievers were WONG Yan-yu Ruby of 7B who scored 3As, CHAN Wai-yee of 7A who scored 2As and 3Bs, CHU Wan-fei of 7A who scored 2As, 1B and 1C, WONG Kai-sum of 7A who scored 2As and 1C and CHAN Wai-sze of 7A who scored 2 As and 1 C .
With outstanding results in the 2010 Hong Kong Certificate of Education Examination, six students namely TSE Wing-ching, LAM Long-hei, CHAN Chunhim, LI Ka-chun, NG Hiu-man and AU Wing-shan were admitted to local universities through the University Early Admission Scheme.
The pursuit of academic excellence is just one of
the major goals of our school. At QES, students are nurtured in a harmonious, stimulating and enabling environment for whole-person development. Our mission is to groom students into responsible young people with good moral, intellectual, physical, social and aesthetic qualities. It is our aspirations that OES students will make themselves contributors to the well-being of their home, country and humanity. Towards this aim, we organize multifarious cocurricular and extra-curricular activities to provide our students with optimal opportunities for realizing their potential to the full and growing in a sense of selfdiscipline, civic responsibility, concern and respect for others and commitment to the common good.
To nurture our students to become future leaders of Hong Kong, we engaged them in various internal and external programmes. For the former, there was the leadership training for all S. 3 students to prepare them for office bearing at senior forms. Moreover, the Prefects and the Big Brothers and Sisters were given tailored leadership training programmes. Student leaders were also nominated to participate in various leadership training programmes organized by external organizations.
Our school is committed to securing every opportunity for students to learn beyond the confines of Hong Kong so that they could develop deeper insights into global issues, especially those closely related to our home country. Our students had participated in such events through school nomination or being awarded free trips for winning external competitions. Their destinations included Guangzhou, Beijing, Taiwan, Hebei, Shanghai, Nanjing, Sichuan, Inner Mongolia, Yunnan, Suzhou and Wuhan. Besides, as our school has entered into sister schools relationship with Ningbo High School on the mainland, there was the Ningbo-Hong Kong Cultural Exchange Tour. In March, 16 of our students went for the tour to Ningbo to learn about the history, economy, culture, urban planning and development of Ningbo. In July, 24 students of Ningbo High School paid a return visit to our school. Through the two exchange tours, teachers and students of both schools gained significant insights into the culture, education and life style of the two cities.
Our students actively participated in territorywide competitions and activities. Besides showing enthusiasm about participation and reaping pleasing results in the Schools Speech and Music Festival and the HKSSF Inter-School Competitions, our students also had outstanding performance with honours and awards won in competitions on academic subjects such as Science, Physics and Mathematics. I take pride in sharing with you our English Debating Team's having won the championship in the $2^{\text {nd }}$ Inter-

Government Secondary Schools English Debating Competitions, and our JPC's having won the Best Secondary School Club Award as well as the Best Leader Award. For details of other prizes, please refer to the School Report.
The support from stakeholders, in particular parents and alumni, is indispensable in the school's endeavour towards sustainable development and provision of quality education. In this regard, we are blessed with enthusiastic and supportive parents as well as old students. Their unstinting support and contributions to the school are highly appreciated. May I take this opportunity to express our sincere thanks to the Parents-Teachers' Association under the chairmanship of Mr. LO Man Fong, Alain and the Old Students' Association under the leadership of Mr. Henry TONG.
Last school year was a very busy and challenging year for all our colleagues whose enthusiasm and dedicated efforts enabled the ongoing prosperous development of the school. I must express my profound appreciation of their total commitment to the goals and mission of the school. My heartfelt gratitude goes especially to all members of the School Management Committee under the chairmanship of Ms WONG Suk Wah Sophia PEO (HK), and colleagues of the Regional Education Office (YTM) headed by Mrs. LING SO Ka-lan Jacqueline for their advice and support on school management and organization. I am also grateful to our two Assistant Principals, Mr. TAM Wing Hung and Mr. TSE Wai-man, for their valuable assistance and contribution to smooth school management and organization work. My sincere thanks also go to the school social worker, Ms. SZE, the clerical staff and the janitor staff for their valuable support and cooperation.
To conclude, our school progressed with strength and vitality in every aspect last year. I am confident the effort exerted will sustain the school development and equip us well for the challenges that accompany the implementation of the New Senior Secondary Curriculum.

Finally, let me thank once again our Guests of Honour, Mr . and Mrs. TONG, distinguished guests and all of you for your presence. May I wish our prize-winners further and greater success, our graduates a bright future and all of you, ladies and gentlemen, happiness and good health. Thank you.

## Annual Speech Day of Queen Elizabeth School on 2 ${ }^{\text {nd }}$ December 2011

Principal Tong，Teachers，Students of Queen Elizabeth School，Ladies and Gentlemen，

It is my privilege to have the opportunity to share the joy of the graduates of QES． I have not only completed my secondary education here but also made life－long friends and met respectable teachers，who have always been my mentors．I would also like to thank Principal Tong for inviting Yvonne，my beloved wife，to attend this special occasion with me．

On my way to QES this afternoon，I tried to imagine how I would feel when I stood on the stage to talk to you as an 86FA old boy of QES．However，the unforgettable interludes of my school days in QES were lingering on my mind like photographs and memories．I remember that I was an active member of the Astronomy Club and the Photography Club．Together with my fellow schoolmates，I learned to appreciate the beauty of nature through the lenses－the sky，stars，people，children＇s smiling faces， flowers，trees and any other things that caught my eyes．There were also moments when I had to play in challenging matches with my basketball team．It seems that I could still hear the thundering applause from the audience who were there to share our joy and tears．Don＇t be surprised if I tell you that I was a member of the mixed choir but it is true．I am delighted that my interest in singing has enabled me to help to raise funds for NGOs（non governmental organizations）now．All these invaluable learning experiences，both inside and outside the classroom，have helped me to extend my full potential．Being an
old student of QES，I will never forget our school motto－Prepare yourself that you may serve．I am determined to make this world a better place by working hand in hand with a number of NGOs and I would like to encourage you to join in，too！
What is a NGO？Well，a NGO is a non－profit－ making organization．It is not part of the government but is funded totally or partially by the government to provide different kinds of services for the community．That＇s why fund－raising campaigns are held by different NGOs from time to time．Have you ever been asked to buy a flag，usually in the form of a sticker，on the street？Flag selling is a common way for NGOs to raise funds to sponsor their activities，for example，Pok Oi Hospital，Yuen Yuen Institute etc．I mention these as examples because I am the Chairman of Pok Oi Hospital，and a Director of the Yuen Yuen Institute and these NGOs are doing very meaningful work for our community．My positions in the NGOs are voluntary．
Of course，there are a lot more other NGOs in Hong Kong and overseas，for example， Caritas，YMCA，YWCA，Tung Wah Group of Hospitals，UNICEF（United Nations Children＇s Fund），The Red Cross，Salvation Army etc．Our own Queen Elizabeth School Old Students＇Association is a NGO helping the education in Hong Kong，not only by working with our mother school OES，but also with OES OSA which operates two secondary schools，two primary schools and two community education centres for the elderly and women in Tin Shui Wai．
Do you know which NGO your school＇s
social worker belongs to? It's the Boys' and Girls' Clubs Association of Hong Kong, which has just celebrated its $75^{\text {th }}$ anniversary. Every school in Hong Kong has a social worker and they come from different NGOs. If you key in the word 'NGO' and search for more information on the Internet, you will be shocked by the huge number of NGOs that are operating all over the world. Let's take India as an example, it was reported that there were 3.3 million NGOs in 2009, whereas in Hong Kong, a comparatively much smaller place, 23,408 NGOs were registered under the Society Ordinance in 2008. Although each NGO has its own vision and missions, they share a common goal to help the underprivileged, e.g. the poor, the elderly, the disabled and the victims of all forms of disasters. Very often, they are associated with the delivery of services and welfare, emergency relief as well as environmental issues. Since NGOs enjoy higher degree of flexibility in management and administration, they are able to provide services for the target groups by filling the gap between the government and the private companies. Without the contributions of NGOs in Hong Kong, I'm afraid that it would be difficult for the government to maintain our territories' harmony, prosperity and stability.
So, how are NGOs related to the future of our young people? All these NGOs contribute a lot to our society by providing services for those who are in need. At the same time, they are also your prospective employers. They offer a large number of job opportunities to the right people, e.g. physiotherapists, radiographers, doctors, nurses, community workers, social workers etc. Like all other private companies, they also need administrative personnel such as project managers, accountants, building and maintenance officers, public relations officers for fund-raising etc. According to JUMP, a popular website for job seekers, a wide range of openings were available in the social services sector and the health care sector. The number of vacancies available
in these two sectors was well above 1,500 from mid-October to mid-November. In addition, many of the well-established NGOs also contribute a lot to the education sector, and they operate many schools. They need to recruit teachers every year, e.g. QES OSA, Pok Oi Hospital, Po Leung Kuk, Yuen Yuen Institute, Tung Wah Group of Hospitals etc. Therefore, you should not only consider working for NGOs as a volunteer, but also think about starting a career path in NGOs.
Opportunities are out there beyond the school gate. We should be grateful to our school for helping us to realize how fortunate we are. Today is your graduation but I would like to congratulate you on your commencement because it is a new beginning. It's your great day! We must always remember our school motto: Prepare yourselves that you may serve. We must grasp every opportunity to realize our potential and commit to the common good in our service to our home, our country and humanity.
I would like to conclude my speech by sharing with you the famous saying of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., 'I have a dream.' # Thoughts at random，fond memories 

Whenever people asked me where I work，I often take pride in a reply saying that at QES and go further to elaborate that it is a quality education school with quality educated teachers and quality educated students．

Had it not been for the contingency arrangement, I would only be able to address the school until December, three months after the start of the new school term.

The school football pitch, a much admired infrastructure at OES and in Mongkok, was completely overhauled with the support of the Architectural Services Department. Formery covered in weeds and in a state of unwanted wear, the football pitch became a pleasant place for student activities on work completion.
The tall trees on the school campus are aged more than twenty years. They have witnessed batches of students develop and school development. Amidst the several tropical cyclones that hit the teritory in the school year 2009-2010, quite a few very tall trees yielded to the typhoons blown at gale force. They had to be felled eventually. It was disheartening to see them being sawed and removed.
Another spectacular occasion was the celebration of the school's $55^{\text {th }}$ Anniversary. The multifarious events such as the Home-coming Day, the 100-table Chinese Banquets, the unveiling of the School Commemorative Plaques, the Fiesta of Expression and the Distinguisthed Alumni Talks were all successfully organized showcasing the collaborative effort of students, alumni, parents and teachers.
The adverse weather conditions in the school year 2010-2011 were tests on our contingency planning. The Swimming Gala and the Sports Day (Heats) had to be cancelled on site. Though reluctant, we had to call off the school functions in the interest of students' safety. We were thrown into a state of despair, as finding a fall-back date was generally impossible when it came to booking of public sporting venues. Fortunately, we were blessed with the good news from the venue managers that respective much sought after time slots were available for us to hold the functions. It was gratifying and amazing.
The power failure, caused by the underground faulty electricity supply cable, happened during the scorching summer months was another unforgettable experience for all. We had to endure working, teaching or leanning in oven-like classrooms. The piled up heat, the stuffy air and the mounting discontent among students made the situation more unbearable. Perhaps our students are spoilt having been able to enjoy the fruit of modern invention and getting intolerant of deprivation and inconvenience.
The completion of the refurbishment work at the School Annexe, down the driveway, provides the school with much needed space for implementation of the New Senior Secondary curriculum as well as promotion of activities such as audio and visual film recording. Again, the personnel of the ArchSD deserved our appreciation for their assistance in interior design.
I have been going at lengths with a recollection of memorable events which come to my mind like flashbacks in a film. I am equally impressed by the effort and performance of our colleagues and students in many other events such as the Christmas Concert, the Class Dance, the Cheering Teams, the Fiesta of Expression, the Home Coming Days, the Open Days, the Singing Contests, the Forums, the Inter-GSS Debating Cormpetitions, the School Canp and the FA Farewell Gathering. Happy faces, laughter, joy, fun and excitement were vivid in my memories.
On school campus, I enjoy watching our students engaging in learning while attending lessons and playing ball games on the playground during recesses and after school hours. Their enthusiasm and total involvement inpress me. It is pleasing to note how well our students behave on hearing the ringing of the school
bell signifying the beginining of a lesson. They immediately wrap up their ball games and walk swiftly back to their respective classrooms. Our school Discipiline Committee is highly effective.
The implementation of the New Senior Secondary Curriculum and the introduction of the HKDSE in recent years have posed great challenge to the school administrators, teachers, students and their parents. All need to adapt to the change and map out strategies to cope with the new teaching syllabus, the examination requirement, the school-based assessment and the teaching time constraint. The school year 2011-2012, being the double cohort year, found our $S 7$ students and $S 6$ students busy preparing themselves for the last HKAL Examination and the first HKDSE examination respectively. Thanks to our colleagues' dedication and professional handling of duties, students' anxiety is seen eased and students get well prepared for the public examination.
As the School Camp will be celebrating its $50^{\text {th }}$ Anniversary in September 2012. planning work has been underway to improve on the infrastructure and mark the school camp boundary. Thanks are due to those who have been actively involved inclusive of the OSA, the PTA, the Old Warden Association, the CWA and colleagues.
At the close of the school year 2011-2012, the school draws up its next 3-year School Development Plan. Our major concerns are (a) to enhance teachers' effectiveness in facilitating students' academic pursuit and whole person development and (b) to nuturue students into confident and self-directed learners. Students will be nurtured into learners with TOP skills and eventually become top students with an enhanced performance in academic pursuits and whole person development contributing to making OES a top school. The TOP skills include the practice of Target setting, Opportunities seizing and Preparedness fostering.
At the school year end, I shall be leaving OES on retirement, after years of hard work. I embrace the opportunities that it offers me in taking a respite, enriching myself, chating a new course and enjoping life. I treasure the experience and joy that working at QES has given me and the friendship that has been made with our colleagues, students, alumnus and parents that I have the privilege to meet. Fond memories will forever be imprinted on my mind.
In closing, I thank OES for having provided me with opportunities to practise my education philosophy and sincerely wish that our school will forever be achieving in providing quality education to our future generation.

- An interview with Mr. Tong Sau-chai, Henry Chairperson of the OESOSA

He is a successful businessman who operates several corporations and big companies. He is a committed philanthropist who has financed the construction of more than 50 schools in Mainland China. But most of all, he is an enthusiastic QES graduate and the chairperson of the Old Students Association (OSA). He is Mr. Tong Sau Chai, Henry, our beloved big brother from 86FA.

Being the chairperson of the OSA, Mr. Tong has high expectations and confidence in his job and the OSA. 'The OSA is to support and assist the development of QES. Till today, he has still maintained an inseparable relationship with his alma mater. recalled when the students sent him mails, thanking him for the facilities and giving them a chance to receive proper education, it was the moment which he felt all effort was worthwhile.

Mr. Tong's full devotion to QES and OSA left us a profound impression. Even though he left QES and continued his higher education in the USA after F.5, he still remembers the precious time at QES. 'The school's spirit and direction of nurturing students haven't changed at all, neither has the students' passion.' Mr. Tong smiled and answered without hesitation, 'When I was at QES, the learning atmosphere was very rich and intense. Though many of our
classmates were from relatively vulnerable families, we were more eager to learn and gain our own knowledge beyond lessons and the classroom. We formed study groups and made discussions after school; we even particularly researched on the characters' profiles of Jin Yong's martial art novels!' Slightly different from students' projects nowadays, Mr. Tong's 'projects' were easy and more interest-oriented. Even they were not guided and without teachers' follow up, their enthusiasm and active learning attitude definitely scored much higher than all of us do in the $21^{\text {st }}$ century.

To Mr. Tong, QES' students are unique and highly motivated. Nevertheless, under keen competition among students nowadays, he agrees that QES students need to improve and excel in order to reach success in the competitive society. 'You may already notice that students from the Mainland China are very hard working and they are getting better. I believe the advantages that Hong Kong students previously enjoyed are, actually, depreciating,' he remarked. Though,

# Key to Success in our Life 

## - An interview with Mr. Shek Kang-chuen, Arthur Deputy Publisher of Hong Kong Economic Times

Seeing our schoolmates' active participation in the events of the Annual Swimming Gala, our Guest of Honour, Mr. Shek Kang Chuen, Arthur, from the 66 Form Association, felt the passion and enthusiasm that QES students have for joining school activities. Knowing the arduous situations faced by students nowadays, Mr. Shek kindly accepted our interview invitation and gave us some advice on overcoming difficulties and how to excel.

'OES students are usually energetic and they participate in different extra-curricular activities.' Mr. Shek said. 'However, living in this bustling city, they also have their tests and exams, which are crucial to their future development.' Regarding this situation, Mr. Shek suggested some strategies to improve our studies. 'It is important to identify our resting time. If we're sleepy, we should go to sleep, or else we will be wasting our time. But if we're not tired, we should wake up and study until we're sleepy instead. Every person has 24 hours each day. Having effective revision time does not mean to use it all, but to use the most efficient and productive time within the 24 hours for revision.

Mr. Shek also recommended us to use our time wisely. He suggested we jot down some notes during revision, and study them again before we go to bed and on the following morning. Through studying the notes three times, the content of notes will be converted into long-term memories. Afterwards, we can revise them once a week, and in our spare time, such as when we are on public transport.

Many people have met obstacles in their lives; Mr. Shek is not an exception. He has taken a valuable lesson of life during the time when he was studying at QES - which has allowed Mr. Shek's own theory of 'setback-tackling' to take form. 'I was a camp warden back in my days at QES.

During camping，there were many unpredictable situations．The bad weather was really a pain in our neck．Yet it does not mean there are no solutions．If we have prepared ourselves，we should be capable of figuring a way out．What matters is whether we are willing to try．＇

On the path of study，students must acquire certain knowledge to form a basis．Later on，it is essential to develop one＇s analyzing and thinking skills．＇Students today are used to reciting and memorizing instead of thinking of the underlying principles critically．Such kind of studying habit is neither useful nor practical for their future career development as you will never find a job that requires no thinking skills at all，＇Mr．Shek said． After periods of learning，it is necessary to apply those skills we have learnt in order to equip ourselves to the greatest extent．Achieving multi－perspective thinking marks the beginning of improvement．

For lifelong learning，Mr．Shek recommended all of us to read the Daodejing（道德經）which records the Daoist words and concepts proposed by Laozi（老子）．He suggested that students in lower forms should start with reading，copying and reciting it all the time as it talks about different profound concepts．Meanwhile，those in higher forms should start to understand in－depth philosophy by heart as they have developed an analytical mind．Daodejing involves a lot of philosophy and ways of handling matters which can benefit our whole life．＇The keys to success lie in the maxim，＂A journey of a thousand miles must begin with a single step＂，which we should never forget．You cannot continue your way if you are unwilling to take the first step．This is indeed a great book for everyone！＇

Lastly，Mr．Shek advised us to live positively and purposefully．This could be achieved by understanding ourselves，knowing the tallies of our physical and mental abilities，as well as considering our time and money，so as to choose the suitable activities for ourselves． He emphasized，＇Life is short and we should treasure every moment we have to do everything we can do！＇

Many mothers understand the importance of education. Some pushy ones, like the "Tiger Mom" who has ignited a firestorm of debate about parenting, have given mom a bad name. Many others, gentler and far less known, in my opinion, are equally powerful and decidedly smarter, and they deserve recognition.

I grew up in a humble family. My mother, like many Chinese women of her age in that era, never went to school. Despite that, she had a strong belief in education and supported to the utmost her children's education all along not just finishing high school, but also going to college, and perhaps even beyond. Getting us a good education was prioritized over many other things, like having a TV, which seemed to be a necessity in the 1970s (we finally got our TV after I finished college). Even though she did not know exactly what a Ph.D was, she supported me unwaveringly to get one in a country thousands of miles away from her. Had it not been for her wholehearted backing in that effort, my life story - beginning with being the first one in the family to go to college - would have been written very differently.

Of course, this belief in the long-term benefit of education is also found in many other moms. About ten years ago, I got stranded in Moscow for a few days because of 9/11 (I was supposed to fly back to Seattle on September 12, but that flight never took off). As it turned out, the extra days gave me some interesting opportunities to learn about Russia, its people — and more. Over dinner with my Russian tour guide, a tall gorgeous young woman studying History at Moscow State University, I asked if she had ever considered dropping college to become a full time model instead, and enjoy an"easy," well-paid, and, above all, glamorous life. She replied, recounting what her mom ( a Russian Jew who lived through the Soviet era ) had told her - the government can always take everything from you, but it cannot take away your education.

I know later that she, like me, went on to complete a postgraduate degree.
And as an old Chinese proverb puts it: it takes ten years to grow a tree, but a hundred years to develop a talent.

## Essay Writing

Hong Kong is a crowded city where people toil and scramble for scarce resources and opportunities．On the other hand，appalling yet commonplace news is that new immigrants often abuse the social welfare system．As they drain on our financial resources，it stands to reason that we should feel indignant that we are obligated to provide for the irresponsible．Little wonder the attempt of foreign domestic helpers（FDHs）to strive for the right of abode has also sparked overwhelming resistance and worries．However，the right of abode should definitely be granted to these FDHs．

To begin with，the arguments against the policy deserve considerable attention． An ostensible reason is that the right of abode for FDHs will wreak havoc on our social welfare system and economy．The government＇s prediction is that the FDHs together with their family will add 500，000 more people to our population，hence a $7 \%$ climb in the unemployment rate and a billion more dollars has to be spent on education and Comprehensive Social Security Assistance．Another concern is that the culture of the FDHs may not match with ours．Be that as it may，these propositions may have been over－exaggerated．

While many assert that several hundred thousand Filipinos or Indonesians will migrate to Hong Kong if granted the right of abode，the allegation is only true to a very small extent．Indeed，Hong Kong is a wonderful place to live in．Still，not all of
the FDHs want to scramble for a spot here． In stark contrast to common perception， surveys indicate the majority of these FDHs want to reunite with their families back home and have little desire to stay．Besides， faulty predictions of the government cast doubts on the aforementioned assertion．In 1999，when the Court of Final Appeal ruled that the children of Hong Kong citizens on the mainland had the right of abode，the government conjectured that an influx of over 1.6 million people would result within 10 years．Curiously enough，up till now， there have only been less than half a million immigrants of this kind，which is a far cry from what was predicted．Other threats such as the foods in supermarkets would vanish into thin air with the implementation of the Food Labeling System，40，000 workers would be sacked with the enactment of the minimum wage law，bars and mahjong club would shut down due to the anti－smoking schemes－have never come true as well． Should we，again，fall for the claims of the doomsayers？Even if all FDHs want to stay， the right of abode will only permit them to apply for permanent residence，which is not a given if the applicant does not meet all the requirements，such as being a tax payer． The unavoidable conclusion is that，the claimed surge in population and resources shortage are simply preposterous．

Much to my dismay，in a place where the virtue of cultural harmony is highly extolled， there are people pushing FDHs away because their culture would not＇fit in＇．What
a slap in the face! It is the wide spectrum of cultures which bolsters our tourism and makes Hong Kong a prosperous and unique international city. We are praised for our pluralism and thus should live up to it. In addition to our reputation, not only are we more than happy to welcome foreigners from developed countries, but we also have our arms wide open to hundreds of immigrants from the Mainland every day. If we can embrace these differences, the task of including the cultures of FDHs into ours should not be arduous.

Of even greater importance is that the FDHs contribute to Hong Kong substantially. With traditional belief deeply ingrained, most Chinese people believe that women should stay at home and take care of the family. Even so, thanks to the help from the FDHs, the family burden of many females is remarkably reduced. Women like Mrs. Anson Chan could successfully raise a family and at the same time could develope a remarkable career. But for the FDHs, would Hong Kong retain its competitive edge with all talented women kept at home? Unmistakably, we owe them big time. Everyone should have the right to live in the place to which they contribute. As the FDHs are part of Hong Kong, they should enjoy this right.

However small the number of FDHs will be granted with the right of abode is, it is valid that the population and competition for resources will climb. Nevertheless, it is incumbent on us to take the risk. For one thing, we should show our gratitude
for their utmost effort to serve us, which deserves a share of our welfare in accord. For another, if we accept the NPC Standing Committee's interpretation of the Basic Law to stop the policy from being rolled out, our judicial independence will be shattered, not to mention our long-hailed justice and equality. When our interests are similarly undermined, it will be us who will be left unprotected by the law and exposed to others' manipulation. On top of these, the perception that FDHs will exploit the social welfare system has no foundation and is therefore nothing but discrimination.

In terms of righteousness and in spite of the aforementioned worries, the right of abode should be granted to foreign domestic helpers. After all, the pursuit of a better life is human instinct - even us Hong Kongers would immigrate to other countries for more favorable living conditions. In this day and age when human rights reign supreme, we should respect others for having such a desire. The bottom line is for the government to be more open-minded, so citizens can be guided to acceptance.


With the rapid growth of the global economy and the advancement in the science field in recent years, while most countries are increasing in national power, no nation is exempt from facing social problems. Energy crises, pollution problems, poor living conditions and so on are all aching problems faced by different countries around the world. However, if I could solve any social issue confronting the world today, I would choose to accelerate the steps towards democracy that are being taken by different developing countries. Dignifying various human rights like the freedom of speech and that of demonstration is the means.
The reasons for boosting the global democratic movement are crystal clear. In some countries, such as the Middle East and China, people have no say in passing government policies. The power of ruling over the country is firmly held by the government or in the hands of dictators. Not only are people deprived of the rights to participate in politics, but they also do not enjoy the freedom of speech to express their ideas freely. Therefore, in order to boost the social status of global citizens and to make the world a more democratic place in which the government and its people can effectively communicate, democracy should be promoted.
Besides, increasing the degree of democracy in nations worldwide is conducive to ensuring various governments' work is monitored. Through a greater participation in politics, people can gain a deeper understanding about the running of their government. Whenever they discover any potential mistakes or risks in the government's administration, they can point out the problems of the government and loopholes of its policies efficiently. Furthermore, rapid exchange of ideas and communication between the local government and people helps promote a country's social and economic growth, which in turn helps promote the world's progress.

Most important of all, boosting a country's
democracy helps consolidate its international status and pave way for a happier life for its people. # Should the elderviv in Hong Kong be given free medical sevices by the government? Law Chun Hei Audrey 4C 

The obroblem of the ageing population is becoming serious in Hong Kong. In the next decade, it is expected that half the population will be elderly people who are more than 65 years old. In recent years, the government has launched the Elderly Health Care Voucher Pilot Scheme, which provides all such individuals with five health care vouchers. It is believed that these vouchers can help ease the burden of medical costs and, at the same time, serve as an acknowledgement of their contribution made to society. However, some elderly people who cannot afford to pay for medical services demand free provision.
It is true that the elderly have contributed a lot to the development of our society so that Hong Kong is now a worldwide-famous financial centre. It is a good idea to show our appreciation to them by giving them free medical services. However, there are some problems which cannot be neglected. If free medical services are to be provided for all elderly people, a really heavy financial burden will be put on our treasury. It will be a huge amount of money, as the elderly have a relatively high demand for medical services. The cost will be very big. For example, most elderly citizens suffer from chronic diseases like joint problems,
high blood pressure and heart disease, they have to see the doctor frequently and regularly. With the increasing number of elderly people in Hong Kong, the government will have to increase the proportion of the medical expenses spent on them. This will probably result in an increase in tax and a greater financial burden on the taxpayers.
In fact, not all elderly people are underprivileged. Some of them can afford to pay for their own medical services or their children can. There is no need to provide free medical services for such individuals. Otherwise, the money collected from tax revenues will be mistakenly allocated. For those who are underprivileged and cannot afford to pay for their medical fees, they can seek assistance from the government. For example, they can apply for the Comprehensive Social Security Assistance Scheme. I am sure the government will do its best to cater for the needs of different people.

To conclude, I am against the idea of providing free medical services for all the elderly as this will increase the financial burden on society. This will also result in discontent among the taxpayers and a sense of unfairness and dissatisfaction will arise.

## No More Tolerance for Shoplifting

Hong Kong is a prosperous city. Most teenagers do not lack daily necessities. However, some teenagers crave for some luxury products of famous brand names that they cannot afford. One of the ways to get these things is to shoplift. They may have a hard time deciding whether to commit a crime.
