# Some thoughts on

## language education

Over the past few years there has been much discussion in Hong Kong about the medium of instruction in schools, as well as concern over the drop in the language competence (Chinese and English) of school children and students in post-secondary institutes. The year 1986/87 witnessed the further strengthening of language teaching improvements through the government's scheme to employ native-speaking teachers of English from the United Kingdom and sending local teachers of English on ILE (Institute of Language in Education) Retraining Courses for four weeks of intensive training in the U.K. Also in 1986 secondary schools were given official encouragement to adopt Chinese as the medium of instruction. Thus a number of important decisions have been made with regard to language teaching and schooling through the mother tongue.

All this hullabaloo over language education is interesting and challenging, and has provoked much scholarly debate and research. However, I will not dwell upon the intricacies of this issue here; rather, I would like to avail myself of this opportunity to discuss certain matters which are relevant to English language learning and which may be of interest to our students.

To begin with, we can identify at least three types of learners of English: English as a native language, English as a foreign language and English as a second language. Different teaching approaches have to be adopted for these purposes.

A speaker of English as a native language acquires English naturally as a young child. He does so usually because his parents use English as their normal means of communication with him and with each other and because English is the language used by the community in which he is growing up.

As you all know, English is spoken as a native language in countries like the United Kingdom, the United States, Canada, Australia and New Zealand.

A speaker of English as a foreign language is usually taught English as a subject at a school or college and lives in a country where English is not normally used as a medium of instruction in schools or on formal and social occasions. The learner does not usually learn English from his parents and does not use it as a means of communication with his parents or in the community in which he lives.

English is learned as a foreign language in many countries of the world, including, for example, China, Japan, Korea, the European countries and the Middle East.

A speaker of English as a second language (ESL) usually lives in a country where English is not the native language of the indigenous population. But in an ESL country English is frequently used as a means of communication between speakers of different native languages, as a medium of instruction in schools and colleges, and also in business transactions, banking and finance, and in the government. In such

countries English is often used by the mass media (newspapers, radio and television) and thus young children have a lot of exposure to the language, even before they learn it at school, and (unlike learners of English as a foreign language) they will not only be taught English in the classroom but will also 'pick it up' when they are not at school.

English is learned as a second language in Hong Kong, Singapore, India, Pakistan, former British colonies in Africa and the Philippines.

ESL learners will never be able to achieve complete native fluency. Even those who achieve a high level of competence will inevitably make 'errors', and many ESL learners will never succeed in correcting the many faulty habits which they developed when they were young as a result of L1 interference and exposure to incorrect English.

Having reviewed ESL and EFL, let me now turn to the varieties of English. All over the world different types of English are spoken and even in England itself there are many varieties of English used in different areas. These varieties are called dialects and can differ from each other in pronunciation (i.e. different accents), in spelling, in grammar and in vocabulary. For example there are very different dialects in the North East, the North West and the South West of England.

There are differences in pronounciation between British and American English, especially of the vowels. There are differences of grammar, so that an American can say **Do you have the time?**, while an Englishman says **Have you got the time?** And there are differences of vocabulary (e.g. elevator/lift; gas/petrol; color/colour; program/programme; railroad/railway, the first word in each pair being American).

In every part of the world where English is spoken, a distinctive dialect has developed as a result of the influence of the linguistic and cultural background of the inhabitants and of the way of life prevalent in the area (e.g. Australian English, Nigerian English, Malaysian English, Indian English etc.) From a sociolinguistic point of view none of these varieties of English is inherently superior to any other; they are all equally valid provided that they achieve efficient communication within the country and are internationally intelligible (i.e. they can be understood by speakers of English from other countries).

Then the question arises as to which variety of English is to be adopted for ESL or EFL purposes. Until recently the answer to this question was inevitably and invariably Standard English as the model for grammar, vocabulary and spelling, and RP (Received Pronunciation) as the model for pronunciation. Standard English is that type of English written by educated Englishmen and RP is that type of pronunciation used by educated Englishmen whose accent is not influenced by any regional variety. RP is also known as the Oxbridge accent, and is adopted by the upper-class speakers in England, e.g. members of the royal family and Mrs. Margaret Thatcher, the Prime Minister. Until recently RP was the only acceptable accent on the British Broadcasting Corporation.

Standard English and RP were the models introduced by the early missionaries, administrators and teachers in what are now ESL speaking countries, and most of the grammar books and textbooks used in these countries conform to these models. However the situation in many of these countries now is that expatriate teachers of English are rapidly being replaced by indigenous teachers who are often competent in the language but incapable of modelling native fluency in written and spoken English. The educational authorities in some countries are therefore considering the possibility of introducing a local variety of English as the model to be taught.

In Hong Kong, we are supposed to be teaching and learning Standard English. The coursebooks (e.g. Integrated English and New Access) and other supplementary reading material are written by native

speakers. Tapes and the wireless induction loop system are available so that students can be exposed to the model of educated native accent. Outside the classroom students can maximise their exposure to the language with the help of the mass media. Hong Kong being a cosmopolitan city, we encounter different varieties of English. And American English is often heard on television and the radio. Children in Hong Kong do not learn English merely through normal schooling. The British Council runs English courses for students who are preparing for the HKCEE, the G.C.E. 'O' Level English Examination and the Cambridge Certificate of Proficiency Test in English.

Thus Hong Kong provides a very good social milieu for the learning of English as a second language. But it has been observed in recent years (as is stated in the Examiners' Reports of the HKEA) that the standard of English is declining. We also know from our casual experience that the average English proficiency in Hong Kong is not as high as that in Singapore, a former British colony which gained its independence in 1965 and which is also a predominantly Chinese community.

There are a multiplicity of factors for this, one of which is obviously the motivation of the learner. As far as ESL is concerned, motivation can be far more decisive than the number of years of learning the language. I have seen students at Q.E.S. who came to Hong Kong from China at the age of 9 or 10 and then began to learn the English alphabet in Hong Kong, while their classmates already had 3 years of English. Yet they have been able to catch up and have achieved admirable results in the HKCEE and the HKAL Examinations. In this respect parental expectation and encouragement do have an important role to play. Proper and constant concern and guidance from parents (not necessarily in the form of actually teaching the language to the child) can often go a long way towards fostering an achievement motivation in the pupil. On the other hand I have also come across U6 students who were fond of doing Calculus or Applied Maths during English lessons. To them the learning of English is a waste of time, and it is therefore not surprising that they did badly in the Use of English Examination.

Another factor for success in learning ESL is the frequency of using the target language in one's daily life. Hong Kong is different from Singapore in the sense that the latter is a multiracial and multilingual country, the population being composed of Chinese (76%), Malays, Tamils (who came form South India) and Europeans. There are four official languages there, and English often serves as the lingua franca - a language for wider communication. Thus a good working knowledge of English in Singapore is almost indispensable for survival. But this is not the case in Hong Kong, where a good deal of communication takes place in Cantonese and where a large number of job situations, notably factory and construction work, do not require a good command of English. This, in turn, is likely to have a tremendous impact on the motivation of the learner.

With the employment of a number of expatriate teachers in government and subsidised schools by September 1987, it is hoped that the tendency towards a drop in the English standard can be reversed. How effective the scheme would turn out to be remains to be seen.

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

# Speech Day Our Principal's Speech

28th Nov., 1986

Mr. Li, Mrs. Li, distinguished guests, teachers and pupils of Queen Elizabeth School,

It is a great pleasure for me this evening to welcome you all to this Annual Speech Day ceremony. In particular, I wish to extend my warmest welcome to Mr. Li Kwan-ha, Deputy Commissioner of Police and Mrs. Li. Mr. Li was a pupil of Queen Elizabeth School. To be precise, he was admitted to the School on 6th September, 1954, the very day when it came into being, and left in 1957 after completing Form 5. At school, the young Li Kwan-ha worked hard and attained excellent examination results. Besides, he served as a class monitor, scout leader, house captain, etc. and he distinguished himself as a leader among his fellow pupils. In recognition of his outstanding service, he was awarded a special prize. After



he left school, he joined the Police Force as a Sub-Inspector. His superior quality, dedication and flair for various aspects of police work have earned him rapid promotions. At present, he is the Deputy Commissioner (Operations), the first local officer who has ever been appointed to such a high-ranking position in the Royal Hong Kong Police Force. We are all very proud of his success and share the honour. Mr. Li's achievements are an example par excellence for all Queen Elizabeth School pupils. Mrs. Li was also a pupil of our school who completed Form 5 in 1957. She was very hardworking and obtained very good results in examinations. Besides, she also participated actively in extracurricular activities. We now look forward very much to Mr. Li's enlightening speech and Mrs. Li's distributing the certificates and prizes.

Copies of the School Annual Report for 1985-86 have been distributed to our guests and I hope you will spend a few minutes reading it in your leisure. Meanwhile, I wish to give a brief account of what we did last school year. In general, all pupils worked hard and behaved well and there have never been any serious problems concerning discipline. Academically, the Form Upper 6 students did well in the Hong Kong Advanced Level Examination. Among the 48 candidates, 45 fulfilled the entrance requirements of the University of Hong Kong with 100% pass in

five subjects. 16 of them were actually admitted to the various faculties of the University of Hong Kong, while most of the others are either continuing their education locally at other institutes of higher learning or have gone overseas to pursue university education. The number admitted to the University of Hong Kong in 1986 would have been much greater if it had not been for the Provisional Acceptance Scheme of The Chinese University of Hong Kong, whereby 10 of our Lower 6 students were admitted in Sept., 1985. This means that these 10 students, who had attained excellent results in the Certificate of Education Examination, would have been among those admitted to the University of Hong Kong. Above all, I am delighted to mention that Chan Tin-lung obtained four A's in the Advanced Level Examination and, being awarded a Lee Shau Kee Scholarship, is now studying Engineering at Wadham College, University of Oxford. As regards the Hong Kong Certificate of Education Examination, the results were encouraging. They were better than those of the two preceding years, 142 out of 150 candidates obtained Grade E or above in at least five subjects - 94.67%. Many of them have obtained brilliant results, among whom Ho Ming-wai was awarded a United World Colleges Scholarship tenable in Italy for her outstanding performance in the Certificate of Education Examination. With regard to the Junior Secondary Education Assessment, all 156 candidates from the normal classes were successful and are now studying in Form 4 in this school, while 5 out of 9 partially-sighted pupils have succeeded in securing places in other Government and aided schools.

Although we have spared no efforts in maintaining a high standard in academic achievements, we have also encouraged our pupils to take an active part in extra-curricular activities and community services. For these numerous and multifarious activities, which are intended to cater for a wide range of abilities and aptitudes, most pupils have shown their keen interest and enthusiasm. I am pleased to report that our Boys'

Basketball Team won the overall championship of Kowloon Division II, and Chan Bik-shan of Form 5A won a Silver Medal in the Shankar's International Children Competition 1985. Another pupil, Chung Ho of Form 4B, won the championship in the Inter-school Chinese Chess Competition. Our school also participated in the 6th Mathematics Olympic for Junior Secondary Schools, which was sponsored by Grantham College of Education, in May 1986. Our team was the second runner-up in the contest.

Ladies and gentlemen, I think you will probably agree with me that the colour and exuberance of life at Queen Elizabeth School can be seen most vividly in its extra-curricular activities and the way in which they are organised. These activities are intended to provide students with the opportunities for healthy personality development and for broadening their horizons, Through their active participation and involvement in clubs, students have been able to learn a lot of things which could not otherwise be acquired from class attendance and textbooks. In running the activities, students in senior forms are often entrusted with positions of responsibility in which they have been able to demonstrate their initiative and independence of mind, reliability as well as leadership ability. And it is satisfying to see that they have learned to make contributions to the community, both within the school and outside.

I have just mentioned that many of our pupils passed the public examinations with flying colours, and that most of our Form 5 and Upper 6



school-leavers have endeavoured to pursue further education, rather than taking a plunge into the world of work immediately after leaving school. This is something praiseworthy, because the pupils themselves and their parents appreciate the value of "increased investment in human capital", to use economic jargon, and that we should never stop learning. Formal schooling seems to have come to an end with the pomp and pageantry of the Annual Speech Day, but I must remind our students that the ceremony today is not merely an accolade of academic achievement but also an occasion for looking forward to the future. I hope therefore, that when you embark upon further studies, you will learn to be critical and interpretative, not mechanical, merely learning off books and handouts without understanding. The spirit of free enquiry is of crucial importance in doing advanced academic work.

Before I conclude, I wish to pay tribute to all members of the staff for their devoted service, especially Mrs. Elaine Wong, Senior Mistress,

and Mr. Lee Hing-kui, Senior Master, for their contributions to the smooth and efficient running of the School. I would like to thank members of the Canadian Club, Miss Lee Wai-lan and Mr. Li Kam-yuk for their very generous donations of scholarships and book grants. Besides, I wish to express our sincere appreciation of Mr. Tong Wai-ki and Mr. Tam Wing-oi for their valuable contributions to the School through the Parent-Teacher Association and the Old Students' Association. Moreover, I would like to mention that, recently, the O.S.A. has raised a considerable amount of money for the creation of a scholarship in honour of Mr. Arthur Hinton, former principal of the School. I wish to thank all the old students who have made donations towards this scholarship.

Finally, I would like to thank Mr. & Mrs. Li Kwan-ha once again for honouring us with their presence and all the distinguished guests who have come to this ceremony. I wish you all every happiness and good health.

# Speech by Mr. Li Kwan-ha Our Guest of Honour

Mr. Principal, Staff and Students of Queen Elizabeth School,

29 years ago, my wife and I left this school upon completion of our Form 5 course. We regard it as a great honour and pride to be invited to your Annual Speech Day Ceremony this afternoon. We are very grateful to Dr. SU for this opportunity of returning to our alma mater and joining you on this happy and important occasion.

As we have come to expect of Queen Elizabeth School, overall academic results achieved by its students are very impressive indeed. On behalf of my wife and myself, I would like to offer our sincere congratulations to Dr. SU and his staff and the students concerned on the success of their efforts. Not every one of us possesses the ability to pass examinations with very high scores. To those who may not have done so well this time, do not feel discouraged. Provided you are prepared to try your best, there are ample opportunities for you to do better in your future endeavours.

Education is a continuous process of fitting oneself to perform a useful role in society to the best of one's ability. You are fortunate in that the school you are leaving has provided you with not only excellent facilities for academic pursuit, but also abundant opportunities for social development through a wide range of extracurricular activities. These activities represent means of cultivating a sense of responsibility,

civic consciousness, leadership, organizing ability, teamwork and a spirit of community service. Few schools have such comprehensive provisions for fostering wholesome social development of their students.

For those of you who are leaving, even though many will be pursuing higher studies, the need for choosing a career will arise sooner or later. We are



fortunate in Hong Kong in that there does not seem to be any shortage of opportunities, but having a large array of jobs to choose from can be both an advantage and a problem.

In considering that I should say to-day, deliberately I come here in this fancy regalia as evidence that I have made progress in my chosen career as a professional Police Officer. I can therefore speak with some conviction in advising you on the vital subject of career selection and career development.

Before we actually start to consider choosing what we will do, it is essential that we ask ourselves the question: what is our aim in life? A perfectly simple question but its answer can be very complex. Our personal principle, our virtue and indeed our attitude towards mankind all have a bearing. This is important in that it affects our later performance in whatever we choose to do.

A common mistake is to consider a job because it has one very attractive feature or is described as glamourous. If that is the base in selecting a career, more often than not, the end result will be disappointment.

In the process of career selection, you should first endeavour to learn as much as possible about the different fields of work available. Then you should make a realistic assessment of your own abilities and interest and try to match them with a field of work. In so doing, you should consider all the aspects of the job, the kind of work involved, and how and why it is done. In a highly materialistic society such as the one we have, quite naturally financial return comes high on the list of factors to be considered in choosing a career. Many people rank security of employment above salary. I would like to suggest an important consideration, and that is satisfaction. In this respect, I quote what Dr. Sun Yat Sen said: "The objective in life is to serve." (人生以服務爲目的) I need hardly remind you of the motto of Queen Elizabeth School, which is, translated into English, "Prepare yourself that you may serve." (修己善群), signifies "cultivate yourself to better the group." The spirit of service is aptly stressed as being our goal. My own experience is that of

a profession which emphasizes service to the community provides a meaningful and satisfying career. I would add that satisfaction is something with which material achievement can have no comparison.

Very often, the question of "How can you achieve rapid advancement?" has been put to me. It is true that I have achieved rapid advancement, but the way to it is indeed quite simple and easy. The fundamental is we must equip ourselves well enough to be able to fully carry out what we should do. What this means is that we must constantly update and improve our general and professional knowledge. The thought that education ceases upon completion of formal schooling is erroneous. The process of preparing and equipping ourselves is a continuous process and should never end. Sound knowledge gives us the wisdom to distinguish between right and wrong. Sound knowledge provides us the strength and ability to do what is right. Sound knowledge enables us to develop our potentials. All these will enhance our overall performance and thus will lead to success.

Many professions have a code of conduct governing the performance of its members. What is more important in governing our conduct and performance is our own moral standing. During the course of your education, I am sure, the importance of high moral standard must have been stressed upon you. Do remind yourselves of this and constantly practise it. Not only will this give you a sense of internal peace, but also will assist you in much better performance in your careers.

The principles of service and self-enrichment that are embodied in the motto of Queen Elizabeth School have stood me in good stead both in selecting a career and in progressing through it.

In conclusion, together with my wife, may I once again congratulate those of you who are leaving and offer you sincere personal wishes that you find fulfillment in life both for yourselves and Hong Kong.



## The Prefect Body


The Prefect Body has been established since the founding of the school in 1954. Since then, we have made every effort to help to ensure the smooth running of the school.


## History Association


Finally, we would like to thank our teachersin-charge for their advice throughout the year. We are looking forward to another successful year with the active support of members and other students.



#### THE D.E.A. SCHEME





Finally, we would like to take this opportunity to express our heart-felt thanks to our teachers-in-charge for their indispenable help and our members for their generous support.




### Pen Pal Club


#### Junior Police Call

#### SCOUT



## Capital Punishment should be abolished?

Nowadays as the liberal thinking of the West is dominating the world, every subject concerning human rights and freedom is likely to arouse great controversy. For instance, the enactment of the Public Order (Amendment) Ordinance has been discussed at length recently. People are pressing for liberty and respect for human rights feverishly in every field. Many countries have already abolished capital punishment while others are going to follow suit. Hong Kong has followed the trend and has already replaced death penalty by life sentence. However, I maintain that careful consideration should continue to be given to the matter, for not only is it concerned about human rights, but it also bears a close relationship with the effective maintenance of public order and the well-being of every one of us.

People who object to capital punishment base their argument on the equality of mankind and the right of survival of everybody. They insist that being equal members of the public, we have no right to take the others' lives, regardless of what they have done, and that we are infringing upon human rights if we do so. Then how do they regard life sentence which has taken the place of death penalty or just simple imprisonment? Do they not deprive the prisoners of their freedom either for their whole lives or just for a certain period of time? We devise laws in order to maintain public order as well as to protect every member of the society. Anyone who dares to challenge the law ought to be punished justifiably. Punishment should be given according to the seriousness of the crime committed and it may take the form of death penalty in critical cases. No mercy should be given if justice must be done or the whole world will be left in chaos.

Capital punishment has its value of existence because of its deterrent effect on crimes. It poses a great threat to the criminals so that they would think twice before committing crimes. Although the worst moral sanction is the fear of punishment, it is undeniably the most effective one at the same time. It is not wise to punish serious convicts such as murderers leniently, as they are a threat to public order and hazardous to our lives. On the other hand, they should be punished with the utmost rigour of the law — death penalty. They have chosen the road themselves and so have to lie on the bed they have made. We should make an example of them. Crime doesn't pay!

What is more, nowadays imprisonment just fails to function as an effective deterrent to crimes. Many criminals, especially the hardened and experienced ones, do not mind being sentenced to jail. The prisoners have set up gangs among themselves, and there are active triad activities in jail. Being fed by the government, part of our taxers' income, just to see the convicts leading a happy life in jail without any sign of regret? Why don't we use the sum of money to serve the poor and the needy instead? We really should not be too lenient towards those inexcusable and incorrigible criminals. Capital punishment serves them right. However, it should only be imposed whenever appropriate and then only after careful judgement of the crime committed. Chances should be given to those convicts who are eager to turn over a new leaf.


In a word, capital punishment should not be abolished, provided it is applied justifiably. Moreover, the role of moral and civic education in reducing crimes should by no means be neglected. The decline of moral standard should be checked and citizens should bear a sense of belonging to the place where they live. This will go a long way towards the reduction of crimes as prevention is better than cure. #### The Role of The School Social Worker

School social work in Hong Kong has a short history. It only started in 1981. Although a social worker has to suffer from a heavy workload, occupational stress and pressure, many dedicated people in Hong Kong still enter this field and try their best to provide many services for our youth.

The main duties of a social worker can be divided into two parts. One is remedial work and the other is preventive work. Remedial work is casework. A social worker studies the family problems of those emotionally disturbed students. These students usually have destructive tendencies and may be hostile to other people. They speak obscene language, disrupt the class or destroy school property. As a result, a social worker will utilise the available resources, such as encouraging them to join in the clubs and extracurricular activities, or giving advice on their school work.



On the other hand, preventive work is concerned with a variety of programmes which are intended to help students to realise their potential and to give them guidance on personal problems. Social workers organise educational camps and seminars. In organising the programmes, they often request teachers to co-operate with them. Tutorial classes and study groups are formed. Through such activities not only can the students improve their academic standards, but the relationship between teachers and students can also be

strengthened. Moreover, careers talks are given to students. School social workers and careers teachers usually invite experienced workers or speakers from the Labour Department or commercial firms to address classes so that students can learn more about job opportunities.

Social workers will never give up on a person. If a student is so bad that he is expelled from school, they will help him to seek readmission, so that he can have a chance to receive education again. If he is found to be incorrigible, and it is impossible for a school to accept him, they will try to find a job for him.

Nowadays the workload of a social worker is becoming increasingly heavy. It is because there is an increasing number of problem students. More students turn bad because of a multiplicity of reasons. For example, working parents have no time to take care of their children. Some parents are bewildered by a lot of problems themselves! They are not well educated. They may even speak obscene language to their own children, and they do not pay attention to their children's school work. As a result, these problem students do not do their homework, but instead they watch television and films all the time which are full of sex and violence. They play with other teenagers in the playground who might become members of the triad society! There is a growing tendency that the triad society is penetrating into schools to seek 'new blood'. Students are often forced to become members, and to take part in criminal activities or drug trafficking. Therefore, juvenile delinquency is on the rise and social workers have to face more difficulties and problems in their work.

In addition, sex is another major problem among school children. Premarital sex goes from junior forms throughout the whole of secondary school. This is not only morally wrong, but such problems as pregnancy may arise.

In order to help the problem children, social workers are paying more home calls, carrying out more activities and promoting programmes. Furthermore, there is sex education for young

people. On the other hand, social workers need the co-operation of the school administration and staff and that of the parents to achieve their goal.

There are, however, not enough social workers. At present, the ratio is one social worker to four thousand students, which means that social workers are working under heavy pressure. If the

ratio is one to two thousand, the situation will be much better. The government should, therefore, do something about it by increasing the intake of Social Work students at the two universities and polytechnics.

The pillar-box is also red. Wherever your friends live, they can receive your letters once you have thrown the letters into the pillar-box. It helps to promote your friendship.



#### The Most Serious Problem In The World Today

The most serious problem in the world today is the confrontation between the two superpowers, the United States and the Soviet Union and the looming threat of a possible nuclear holocaust arising from such international rivalry. After the Second World War, the Cold War developed as the relations between the two countries deteriorated because of their ideological differences, mutual suspicion and misunderstanding. And the Russian expansion into Eastern Europe in the postwar era caused further suspicion. A number of satellite states have been formed in Eastern Europe and have come under Russian domination over the past four decades.

This rivalry has far-reaching consequences on international affairs. Nowadays, people have no doubt about the devastating power of nuclear weapons. The armaments race between the countries of the NATO and the Warsaw Pact makes a nuclear war imminent. When it does happen, no longer will one Hiroshima be destroyed, but thousands. One should not expect the possibility of escaping from such a war, for it is likely to be a global war.

Most of the countries in the world align themselves either with the United States or the Soviet Union. Both are anxious to carry out subversive activities or even local wars in the other's "sphere of influence" in order to weaken her enemy. The Korean War and the Vietnam War are good examples of this. Moreover, their support of their allies just serves to encourage them to pursue an aggressive policy, like the American support for Israel and Russian support for Libya. In fact, they are mere "puppets" of their masters in the struggle for power, which is often done at the expense of innocent lives. In this internecine conflict, economic growth has been hampered and tens of thousands of people have been made homeless.



The solution to this problem seems to be to hold meetings. And I agree with this too. But the statesmen must not treat the meeting as a game. They should not regard international conferences as a means for raising personnal prestige or have no wish for compromise in mind. They should be confident of reaching an agreement, be willing to make concessions by sacrificing national interests and put aside the mistrust that has always existed.

If not, they are only wasting precious time and making the masses feel disillusioned.

In conclusion, the world is once again divided into two hostile armed camps after the two World Wars. Without learning their lesson from precedents, they are just risking the lives of billions in a future nuclear war. As for their allies, they are foolish enough to be "dogs fighting for their masters in a power game". Therefore, it is not

surprising that superpower confrontation is the most serious problem in the world today. And we must assert that real peace and harmony among nations, rather than the present situation of an armed truce or detente, could be maintained and strengthened only if the superpowers and their allies show genuine concern for human welfare, and are willing to bury the hatchet.

#### Tourist development in the Third World is a good thing?

Tourist development in the Third World has always been a controversial issue. People argue for or against this idea not without sensible reasons. Anyway, nothing is one-sided. Everything under this giddy firmament works both ways.

Undoubtedly, the tourist industry does provide a lot of job opportunities. For example, the building and running of hotels create a vast pool of employment. However, in fact much of the wealth goes into the hands of foreign investors such as those multinational hotel developers. Even though a small proportion of the native inhabitants may get rich as a result of tourist development, the majority may remain poor, possibly because of exploitation by the local developers.

Another point is that tourism brings in foreign currency. The selling of local products, and the provision of hotel accommodation and various catering services attract foreign spending. This to some extent raises the national income and in turn the local standard of living rises. But sometimes tourist catering business takes the form of prostitution, as in Thailand, Taiwan and the Philippines, where hundreds or even thousands of teenage girls from poor families have become prostitutes because they want to earn 'quick and easy' money. This leads not only to decay in social morality but also infamy of one's country.

Tourism introduces people of the developing countries to the Western way of life. This may open up their minds and instigate their desire to emulate other Western societies. Foreign investment in local tourist industry induces the use of new, advanced equipment and administrative methods. Canton is a very good example of a developing city which is receiving massive foreign investment. However, constant exposure to Western influence might have harmful effects on local residents. Ideas like materialism, unbridled hedonism and westernisation of the life style might gain the upper hand. People get brainwashed and tend to look upon the Western world as a 'paradise' where all sorts of excitement and enjoyment without work are a veritable fact of life. The situation may become aggravated as the appearance of tourists does in a sense suggest the idea of 'Western abundancy' to the local inhabitants.

Anyway, tourism does allow good public relationships to be developed between countries. A nation may set up special departments for promoting her own tourist industry among foreigners, thus enhancing the reputation of one's country. Cultural intercourse among different races and nations is also beneficial to the establishment of a harmonious world.

Moreover, in order to attract more tourists, local traditions are utilised and displayed. In Hong Kong, Chinese opera and other performing arts and crafts have always been of great interest to a great number of Western tourists. In this way, traditions are preserved and even exalted.

In conclusion, tourist development in the Third World is certainly advantageous to the countries concerned. Although some evil side-effects may surface, it is the government's task to implement the appropriate measures to prevent them from happening, or at least to reduce their severity. After all, you have to sacrifice something if you want to achieve a goal, and how much would be sacrificed depends on your wit and wisdom.

#### Welcome the tobacco ads ban

The proposal, by the Broadcasting Review Board, of the cigarette advertising ban was finally passed. This proposal has been a widely-debated issue. It has won many supporters, but at the same time aroused strong public opposition. The proposed policy is supported mostly by the medical profession and people in the educational circles and the social services. The point at issue is the hazardous effects that cigarette advertising imposes on the minds of the young and the harm that tobacco does to human health. Those who go against the ban are people in industry and commerce. They look at the issue from the financial point of view. Sales is what they are most concerned with. Apart from this, they are stuck to 'freedom'. They argue that the ban on tobacco advertising would desperately pose a threat to the freedom of the speech and the spirit of freeenterprise. To them, the freedom to advertise is also a manifestation of democracy.

Personally, I support the advertising ban. There is no doubt that cigarettes are harmful to our health. One newspaper says 'There is no scientific basis that smoking is addictive and hazardous to health'. This is a very unconvincing argument. Saying such thing is like saying 'There is no scientific basis that cutting one's finger with a knife is painful'. It is nonsense! Experience tells you about that already. Millions of people have died of lung cancer. So, the physical harm of cigarettes is of minor concern in my support for the advertising ban. I oppose tobacco advertisement on T.V. and radio because they adversely influence the minds of the young. They play a strongly persuasive role. It is specially dangerous as the advertisements are conducted on such popular media as T.V. and radio to which youth are frequently exposed. The advertisements often implant some wrong ideas. For example, smoking is unreasonably associated with heroes, success, adulthood, smartness and status. The influences of these images may not come immediately after the broadcast of advertisements. They may have longterm effects. A youth may not accept an idea at the beginning, but frequently repetition of the message eventually impresses it on his mind even without his knowing it. Advertisements are really powerful in influencing people's attitudes and beliefs, although not instantly.

Some people may argue that the ban on cigarette advertisements poses a threat to freedom. In fact, this is a controversial problem very similar to that of obscene or objectionable publications. Harmful effects are obvious. But people are driven to a choice between the protection of the immature against evil influences and the respect for the rights of the mature. In these cases, I think we should not abuse the concept 'freedom'. Indeed, it has been overused. Freedom is enjoyable and rational only under certain circumstances i.e. if it does not jeopardise rights of others and the overall well-being of society. If it is said that freedom in speech and advertising should be upheld, then the freedom of the individual to avoid influence from hazardous ideals should also be preserved and should not be sacrificed under any circumstances. A mother has an absolute right to have her son grow up healthy without the shadow of the advertising of such dangerous and addictive products. I appreciate what one newspaper says 'I am not against considerate smokers and what they do with their money, their lungs and their health is their business ..... The problem is that there is an industry which will try with all its might and money to seduce our children to join the lemmings.'

Banning cigarette advertisements shows that the government is responsible and cares for its people. I am very glad to see this active move of the government. In my memory, the government has yielded to big financial cartels. Now, facing the great pressures from advertising and the tobacco and broadcasting industries, it stands out to make such a 'brave' decision. It's marvellous! I will always be on the 'supporting' side.

A Debate on the Motion 'All Chinese Speaking Students in Hong Kong Secondary Schools should be Educated in the Medium of Chinese rather than English'.

Judges, my dear opponents, Ladies and Gentlemen, today, we are going to debate on the motion: 'All Chinese speaking students in Hong Kong secondary schools should be educated in the medium of Chinese rather than English.' In my opinion, this proposal is a totally ridiculous and unreasonable idea.

First of all, I would like you to look at the motion more closely. It says, "All" the "Chinese Speaking Students" in "Hong Kong" "should" be educated in the medium of Chinese rather than English.' Mind you, it says 'all', which means everybody, with no exception. And the word 'should' also has a sense of obligation. Therefore, if I can prove that one Chinese-Speaking student in a Hong Kong secondary school should be taught in English rather than Chinese, then today's motion will not stand.

Firstly, I would like to remind you that today's motion is concerned with students in Hong Kong, and Hong Kong, as you know, is internationally known as a 'free port'. What does 'free' mean? It means people are not forced into doing anything they don't want to do, and that they have a choice! Then how can you oblige 'every' student in Hong Kong secondary schools to be educated in Chinese? Shouldn't they have a choice? Would you call this 'free'?

Secondly, the words 'Chinese-speaking students' are rather ambiguous. You know, Chinese-speaking students are not necessarily be better in their command of Chinese than in English. A lot of foreigners speak Chinese rather

fluently, does that mean they should be educated in Chinese as is stated in the motion? The answer is obviously in the negative.

Thirdly, as I have already pointed out before, this motion is concerned with students in Hong Kong. As we all know, Hong Kong is a cosmopolitan city and there are a lot of business transactions between Hong Kong and other countries in the world. In order to communicate with people in other countries, one should be able to speak an international language and English has virtually been adopted as such a language for the past decades. But the problem is that nearly 98% of the population of Hong Kong is Chinese. That means most of our family members and friends are Chinese, so we seldom have the chance to practise our English. Therefore, if Chinese speaking students are taught in Chinese, their most likely way of practising their English is cruelly cut off. I have to remind you that constant practice is very important for learning a language. And of the people of Hong Kong cannot speak English fluently, how can they communicate with people in other parts of the world? This will certainly affect Hong Kong's status as the third largest financial centre in the world.

My last point is that, though with shame, we have to admit that most scientific inventions and technological innovations have originated in the western countries, notably the limited states where English is the official language. Therefore we will not be able to understand what the innovations are about if we are educated mainly in Chinese and are thus only familiar with scientific terms in Chinese. Translation is required and a lot of precious time is wasted. A lot of changes may have taken place during the time of translation which means we will always be lagging behind. Do you think this is suitable and economical for this fast changing world? Again, the answer is 'no'.

All the evidence above leads to one important conclusion that not all the Chinese speaking students are to be educated in Chinese. There should be flexibility and freedom of choice for the individuals. Therefore, today's motion is not to stand.

#### 國父孫中山先生

今年是一代偉人、民主革命先行者孫中山先生誕辰一百二十周年,又是辛亥革命七十五周年。大陸和台 灣都在積極籌備,隆重紀念。

#### Dr. Sun Yat-sen

This year is the one hundred and twentith anniversary of the birth of Dr. Sun Yixian, who was a democratic revolutionary pioneer and earned great popularity by his greatness and unselfishness. It is, at the same time, the seventy-fifth anniversary of the 1911 revolution. Mainland China and Taiwan are now busy preparing for a solemn memorial ceremony.

Dr. Sun Yixian, who devoted forty years to revolutionary work for the acquisition of freedom and equality for China had, during his hard, long struggle, stayed in Hong Kong for more than once.

Born into a poor peasant family, he showed great concern for and understanding of the peasants' painful situation. He sympathized with the masses of the peasants and believed that the hard life of the Chinese peasantry should not exist permanently. The exceptionally hard life of his family, in addition to his home's old anti-Manzhu tradition, made Sun Yixian become precocious.

In the delicate and innocent heart of little Yixian, a strong feeling against the existence of social injustice and unreasonableness developed. He opposed the old practice of 'foot-binding' and disliked the inhuman behaviour of the incompetent and corrupt bureaucrats. He also grew dissatisfied with and suspicious of the traditional evil practices when he was only about ten years old. When he was twelve, he accompanied his mother to Hawaii. During those five years of staying abroad, he opened wide his eyes to the advanced scientific and cultural knowledge and was open-minded in acquiring it. In 1883, he came back to his homeland and felt even more dissatisfied with the deteriorating society. Therefore, a strong desire to re-establish his homeland flourished in his mind.

#### The treatment of illness

It is important to remember that all illnesses and diseases are more easily cured in the early stages. Unfortunately many people wait until the condition is quite far advanced before seeking medical advice. We are usually aware when some parts of our body is not functioning properly. Some people just wonder what is wrong but do nothing about it. When we are not feeling completely well, even though the cause may be something trivial, we should always discuss it with a doctor if it persists. Family doctors deal with all sorts of conditions and illnesses and do not mind discussing things which are not serious; the simple fact that someone is worried about his health means that he needs help and advice.

Many minor ailments, of course, are not at all worrying, and do not require treatment from a doctor. Such things as the common cold, occasional headaches and stomach aches or minor injuries can be treated by home remedies, It is quite all right to treat these things yourselves, as long as you are not repeatedly having to take patent medicines. Some people almost live on patent medicines. These may become a habit which is worse than the condition for which they are taken. Although most patent medicines are probably harmless, it is harmful to become dependent on them. A person who is repeatedly having to take aspirin for a headache should find out what the headache is due to and have its underlying cause treated.
