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

### QUEEN ELIZABETH SCHOOL SPEECH DAY, 18-12-70

# THE PRINCIPAL'S SPEECH



Mr. and Mrs. Chamberlain, ladies, gentlemen and students.

First of all let me thank you all, especially the visitors, for being present here this evening. It is not easy for most of you to spare the time for occasions such as this, and so please do accept the thanks of the School for the trouble you have taken and for the time you have managed to spare to make this ceremony a pleasant and successful one. The occasion is made more pleasant for me by the presence here this evening of our guests of honour, Mr. Chamberlain and his wife. Mrs. Chamberlain has agreed to present the awards and Mr. Chamberlain to address us all afterwards. Mr. Chamberlain is back in familiar grounds as he taught here for several years before spending several more years at Northcote College of Education where he became acting Principal before returning here to become Principal in September, 1967. He left here in April 1970 on leave and has only recently been appointed Principal of Sir Robert Black College where we wish him all that is best. With us to-night also we have three long serving teachers who have also left. Mr. Chu Ka Fai, senior master and also acting Principal during the leave of Mr. Chamberlain, Mr. Cheung Poon, a highly experienced teacher of Chinese, and Mr. Kwok Ying Kee, senior laboratory technician and a very hardworking and versatile person. These three teachers are or were members of the original staff and their service goes back to 1955. I am very glad also of the presence of Mr. Alfred Ling on his second appearance here at this ceremony as President of our Parents-Teachers' Association. He also is no stranger here as he spent eight sound and useful years teaching in this school before he left for administrative work in the Education Department. Also very welcome is Mr. Ho Sai To, President of the School's Old Students' Association. The school is very grateful for the help and support it has received from these Associations.

You have in your hands a concise Report for the academic year 1969/70. If you wish to supplement this information you would be well advised to get hold of a copy of our School Magazine for 1970 and you will obtain a full and much more detailed picture of the School, its life generally, and its manifold activities and facets. It costs HK\$3.00 and is very good value indeed.

I am happy to refer to the two items during the past year which have now become a reality. Thanks to the strenuous efforts of Staff, especially Mr. So Yan Kin, now the Senior Master, the students and the P.T.A., sufficient money was raised by the very successful bazaar of the previous year to make generous provision for the Students Welfare Unit and to allow for the provision of a 42 booth language laboratory for the school and the installation of a much needed telephone line to the School Camp. The language laboratory has given a real boost to English language teaching. The project involving the affiliation of the School

with the Fong Yuen Primary School in Ma Wan Island has got into its stride and this year has seen it proceed on a sound financial basis. The future project involving the use of funds (HK\$2,000.—) from the successful bazaar previously mentioned, namely the installation of two cooled water drinking fountains, is a near reality and will be so before the summer. These projects can be read of in more detail in the Report and in much greater detail in the School Magazine.

Also in those one can read of the great variety of extra-curricular activities available to the students of this School, and, by and large, enthusiastically taken up by them. I am highly pleased at the interest and enthusiasm shown by students in fields as diverse as social service, games and activities of all kinds. There is, in fact, for the student who enters this School a very wide spectrum of choice, endeavour and opportunity ranging from the academic to the physical. I will not strain your attention by reciting the entire range of subjects, activities, cultural Associations, clubs and so on available to the student, but I can say with deep conviction that students who pass through this School will find their minds stimulated and broadened and their characters and personalities deepened and strengthened. Let me in a brief comment emphasize this by pointing out that during the year two of our students, Fong Kui Kwong and Tse Ng Hang were selected for the very tough Outward Bound School Course in August and passed successfully; the acting Head Boy, Kong Kwok Ching, now the Head Boy, was the only student selected by the Education Department to be one of the 15 participants of the Hong Kong Delegation to the Expo '70 World Youth Camp in Japan, while another student Wong Pang Ying gained an incredible 5 distinctions in

the University of Hong Kong Advanced Level Examination in the summer and was awarded a total of five scholarships as the best student qualified to enter the University in the year 1970/71.

So much of all this, of course, depends upon the Staff, and it is of the Staff and to the Staff I now speak. There has been, as in other walks of life quite a number of changes and additions. To all those teachers who have left us on Promotion, transfer or retirement, we again express our warmest thanks and appreciation and again repeat the warm welcome we have already given on previous and more intimate occasions to those who have recently joined the School. We have now a predominantly young, enthusiastic and well qualified staff with the important and necessary leavening of older and experienced teachers. While I am in fact, as a new Principal, stopping outside the boundaries of the academic year 1969/70, I feel I must offer to the Staff the deepest thanks of the graduates, students and myself for your unremitting hard work, your time, co-operation and your most pleasant manner, and particularly for your breadth of mind and vision which has the good sense to disregard trivia and to concentrate on larger issues to the great benefit of this School. Without these qualities the opening in this building of not one but of three schools on September 1st, 1970 would have been well nigh impossible. That however, is a matter for next year's Report and I will leave it that. But let me end with a special note of thanks also to the Senior Master, Mr. So Yan Kin and the Senior Mistress Mrs. Betty Li who were also so helpful to Mr. Chu Ka Fai and later to me personally.

I now have the pleasant privilege of asking Mrs. Chamberlain to present the awards and prizes to our students.

# SPEECH BY MR. T.McC. CHAMBERLAIN,

### PRINCIPAL OF SIR ROBERT BLACK COLLEGE OF EDUCATION



Mr. McNeill, Ladies & Gentlemen, Boys & Girls,

This evening is rather like a home-coming for me as I have spent some 9 enjoyable years in this school and I have very happy memories of the friendliness here of both the staff and the students. It is a great privilege for my wife and I to be welcomed back tonight to this Speech Day. I think I have been to nearly every speech day that we have held in this hall either as teacher, as guest, as principal and now finally as Guest of Honour. In fact one year as teacher I was the last in the procession up to the platform and found there was no seat for me so I had to go back down into the hall.

When I heard about my transfer to Sir Robert Black College it was with very mixed feelings. Of course there is a stimulation about getting an interesting new post but I was very sorry indeed to hear that I was leaving you. This is the only secondary school that I have taught in since I qualified as a teacher and it will always have a special place in my affections. I first joined the school in 1955 when we were still sharing the King's College building in the same way that you have been sharing at the beginning of this term. We moved into these buildings later in that year. Very few of the original staff still remain but there is continuity since some of the original students are now members of staff.

The school spirit has developed and the school is now one of the leading schools in both the academic and the extra-curricular fields.

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It has been interesting to watch the development of the school from its early beginnings and to see a definite "personality" appearing. What has been so pleasing to see is the development of the spirit of public service. This appears in many ways and in many activities such as the teaching in Hayling Chau, the blood donations, the Luen Yi project on Ma Wan Island, and the various parties for handicapped and under privileged children held at this time of year. Also, of course, within the school there is the Welfare Unit, the Camp Committee, the Prefects, the Monitors, Club Committees, Scouts, Guide and Red Cross.

I have always been very impressed by the will-ingness of students here in H.K. to help others less fortunate or do social service of some kind. It is wonderful to see students directing their energies to such a worthwhile end. This compares very favourably with the reports from overseas of students who seem to be more interested in destruction rather than construction.

There is so much in Hong Kong that needs to be done to improve the environment and it will need all our energies working constructively to tackle them. In the past there has been a need for adults to organize all these activities and to be the instigating force. However in the past year or two I have seen signs that students are more and more able to organize these constructive activities for themselves with the minimum of adult guidance. This is a welcome development since there is so much energy available that can be channelled into constructive activities if it is only given the chance.

This school has a fine record in this field but you must not relax and it is up to the leaders in each year to see if they can do even better than the year before.

May I close by echoing Mr. McNeill thanks to staff for their willing, loyal, hard-working and long-suffering support to me while I was here. I would like to thank you boys and girls for your welcome to my wife and myself this evening and I would like to say that I am very proud to have been associated with this school for so long.

# FAREWELL ADDRESS BY MR. CHU KA FAI, THE ACTING PRINCIPAL 14, JULY, 1970.

Before I leave, I would like to talk about a few of my happy and unforgettable experiences during my stay in this School. When I first joined the Staff of Q.E.S., I was one of the young members of the School. Inexperienced and anxious, I was very strict in discipline, and harshly scolded students when they made mistakes or when they were lazy. On one occasion, in the heat of my anger, I ordered a student to stand on a bench in the chemistry laboratory. I was then known to the students as an over-strict teacher and they were very afraid of me. Whenever they saw me in the school or in the street, they put their tongues out of their mouths at once, turned round and walked quickly off in another direction. They nicknamed me the "atomic ghost" which, I guess, means the most horrible spirit in the world. An old Q.E.S. student, now my own colleague, once told me the reason why she dropped chemistry in Form IV was that she was frightened of me. In recent years, I have become more human, more mature and more sympathetic towards the students. They now even dare to come to me and occasionally make jokes with me.

In 1959, when I was the Form-teacher of Form Upper 6B, my class had to stage a short play in the end-of-term concert. The class monitor, now a medical practitioner, approached me for permission to allow the class to put on a play about me. I gave them the permission only very reluctantly. When I watched the play, I was very surprised to find that I enjoyed it very much. The monitor played the part of me. He mimicked my way of punishing students, my voice, my gestures and my movements in class. Indeed, he acted so well that the class won the first prize for end-of-term activities. It was only after this performance that the students began to realize that I am not so much an "inhuman" being.

I sometimes felt that Q.E.S. students are selfish. They are ready to take but not to give. But, their enthusiasm in the fund-raising bazaar last summer, the voluntary contribution from Form L.6A this year to sponsor a child in the Po Leung Kok,

has proved my opinion of the students is absolutely wrong and I am very glad to know that I have made a mistake in my judgment.

Now, I must say that I am somewhat torn between feelings of joy at the prospect of the new work awaiting me and feelings of sadness that I must leave you. For the past 15 years I have worked in this school as a Chemistry teacher, as Senior Master, and now as Acting Principal. I have seen how the school has developed and grown in stature under the very capable leadership of my predecessors, Mr. Cheong Wai Fung, Mr. A. Hinton, Mr. Tsang Kook Kuk, Mr. Li Shi Yi and Mr. T. McC. Chamberlain. In the early years of its existence, parents had little confidence in sending their children to our school; rather, they preferred sending them to well-established ones. As our school developed, however, it gradually established a high reputation both in academic work and in activities, which in turn caused the parents to change their attitude toward us. Today the number of students applying for admission far exceeds our vacancies. Our achievements are of course the result of the joint effort of the former principals, the staff and the students.

Fifteen years is not a short time in one's working life. But when I look back on these 15 years, I will always cherish one thing: that Queen Elizabeth School is a happy school. It is a happy school because the relationship between the principals and the staff, between the teachers and the students, is friendly and co-operative, and the general atmosphere is at once liberal, democratic and congenial. Every one shows genuine concern for one another, and everyone tries his best and gives his best. Although I am leaving now, I am certain that under the able leadership of Mr. H.N. McNeill, the new principal, these good traditions will continue to flourish, and the school will be a happier one still. Finally, with all my heart, I would like to thank my colleagues for the excellent work they have done. And to you all, every happiness and success.

# A LETTER FROM MR. CREW

When I came to Hong Kong in 1962, I went to King George V School, where I worked for six years. Although teaching there was interesting, it did not give me a chance to see Hong Kong pupils, and so I was pleased when I came to teach in Queen Elizabeth School, Probably some of you can remember how Mr. Chamberlain gave me several classes of general current affairs. This gave the pupils and me a chance to find out whether or not we could understand each other. Rather to my surprise I found that the standard of English was good. But I had to keep telling myself not to speak too fast! Our shyness soon wore off and we ail got along well together. All the classes were hardworking and always tried their best. All the teachers were pleasant and friendly (at least, to me!)

When I went back to England for a holiday in

May, 1970, I first flew to Kebul, the capital of Afghanistan. There I stayed four days. People of many races and nationalities mix there, and it makes no difference who you are, everyone is treated hospitably. Then I travelled by coach to Turkey. This was a long ride, and we had to get up so early in the morning that I decided not to shave. By the time I reached England, I had a beard (almost) as good as Mr. Chamberlain's! From Turkey I went by train to France, then crossed by ferry to England.

In September, I flew back to Hong Kong and found to my surprise that I was not returning to Queen Elizabeth School, but to the Inspectorate. I shall miss the friendly and hard-working pupils. As I travel in Hong Kong, many teachers tell me what a good reputation Q.E.S. has. I wish you all success, and hope to visit you again, soon.

We held our annual general meeting on 26th October, 1970. The committee of the Association was elected on that day. General meetings were held occasionally for various purposes.

### BADMINATION CLUB




We have forty registered members this year, and we have a regular meeting every week. We are faced with the problem that our members do not have much knowledge in the field. However, they all show great interest, and are eager to learn. During every meeting, members are taught very basic things. They are given notes on symbols of wireless parts and simple circuits. We have experiments afterwards. Every member is given some radio parts to construct his own wireless sets. We encourage the members to read more books and lend them the few books and magazines we have.

Besides radio receivers and amplifiers, we have succeeded in the construction of a multi-purpose instrument specially designed for our members, a transistor tester and an FM transmitter. Besides, we have constructed some sets simply for experiments, such as remote control, photo-electricity, and R.F. power amplifier.

An FET voltmeter and an FET electroscope were also planned. We also promised to assemble a portable microphone for the school.

However, these were confined to the work of a minority of senior members only. The majority of our members, mainly from lower forms, are fascinated by simple circuits.

We are interested in many kinds of semiconductors such as IC, SCR and UJT. We have not yet laid our hands on them as we are financially poor.







#### THE SCHOOL PLAY

The school play was staged on 30th and 31st, Oct, 1970. It was a three-act play, written and conducted by Mr. Tsoi Heung Sang.

The story tells of a series of mysterious murder. The motive of the killer a doctor, had deprived a fellow worker of the document of a recent discovery. He succeeded because everyone was deluded and convinced that it was the ghost to be responsible.

Story of this kind is usually stale and arouses no interest. However, with a skilful and well-calculated transformation, the play comes up vivid and fragile. Climaxes were closely linked and well handled. Atmosphere amounted to bowstring strength in every breath-gripping phase.

The stage decoration was pleasant. The sound and light effect was worth celebrating. In fact, they had created so ghastly an atmosphere that girls screamed at every impending of a ghost. The skill in the make-up also worth a word of praise on this account. The performance of the actors was, as a whole, smooth and nice. However, some of the acting lacked penetration, and were inarticulate in regard to manifestation of strong and deep emotions.

The plot was clearly outlined. It presented graphically and logically the whole framework of the story. Meanwhile, it omitted not even the minutest detail that enabled the viewers to grasp a firmer picture of what was going on.

Our dramatic society has a long and glorious history. In comparison to the previously staged play—Arms and the Man; the conductor being the same one of the recent successful play—loses much of its colour. Yet everyone felt encouraged to see such a great effort shown by the members. And finally, a warm and sincere compliment to our present drama society—its members and especially its teacher in charge. The imminent progress since the play of last year had paid tribute to them in their effort to present a better and yet better play.



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Every past Christmas our school hall was fully engaged and this year it was certainly the same. Several parties were held in the hall.


#### The Ma Wan Christmas Party

#### The O.S.A. Christmas Party


This party was held on Christmas Eve from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m. of Christmas morning.

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
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The date was 23rd March, a Wednesday. We had our final rehearsal in that evening. To

#### THE STUDENT CONCERT NIGHT



The 15th May witnessed our Student Concert Night in the Q.E.S. Hall.

The concert was well-attended—over 400 fellow-students were present, together with three honourable judges—two lady teachers and one gentleman. Besides we had two honourable guests, the Chairman (and his wife) of the Canadian Scholarship Association. The concert started a little after eight in the evening and was expected to end at 10 o'clock but the concert did not end until a quarter past eleven.

The concert was sponsored by the Prefects and the Club Chairmen Association. Programmes included folk singing, piano solo, Pei Pa solo, a shadow play and finally the Form Competition. The shadow play was organised by the Prefects and the Club Chairmen Association, while we had folk singing by F. 1 and F. 4, plays by F.2 and F. 3, and a "Metamorphosis" by the F. L6 students in the Form Competition.

We were very happy to have the three teachers, the principal and also the senior mistress to pass the evening together with us, when they should be taking a rest at home with their family after the whole week's toil. We hope, we will enjoy more school activities of such kind and we look forward to seeing more participant in the next concert and a greater variety of programmes.

#### THIRD SECONDARY SCHOOL STUDENT SEMINAR

The Secondary School Student Seminar was nitiated in 1968 by Wah Yan College, Kowloon. Q.E.S. has been a delegating school in the past two years. This year, our school is one of the organizing schools. Four of our students attended this seminar, two of them being organizers while the other two being delegates. Here is a brief report by two of them.—Editors

The Third Secondary School Student Seminar was held from 19th to 22nd February, 1971, at Wu Kai Sha Youth Village. The organization of this seminar is a combined effort of the students of ten different secondary schools, and supported by over fifty other various schools. The aim of the seminar was:

- to gather together the secondary schools and to solve their problems,
- 2. to promote mutual understanding between secondary school students and the society,
- 3. to train student leaders.

The first meeting of the organising committee was held in early October, and from thence we were in busy preparation for the seminar. The theme of this seminar was carefully discussed, and ultimately chosen to be 'Secondary School Stu-

dents and Society'. The theme was considered to be worthy of discussing because it related secondary school students with the society. Under the main theme, there were four sub-topics:

 The mutual responsibility between secondary school students and the society. tl

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- 2. Bad habits of secondary school students.
- 3. How to correct these bad habits?
- To better the mutual understanding between secondary school students and the society.

Over a hundred delegates attended this seminar. They were divided into groups. During group discussions, ideas were collected and were put forward to the plenary session. Talks and panel discussions were usually held before group discussion.

On the last day, in the final plenary, the communique (report of the ideas of the whole seminar) was passed. In the conclusion, an ad hoc committee was set up for the preparation of an action which was supposed to bring the things discussed into reality

#### EXPERIENCE FROM THE OUTWARD BOUND SCHOOL

The twenty-six days made a wonderful period for the lads in the Outward Bound School. They struggles for nothing but experiences throughout the course.

During World War II, the English ship Outward Bound was sunk by the Germans. It was hard for the survivors, especially the old people, to live on the isolated islands nearby. Fate seemed to have sympathy on these old men, for most of the young men died before they were saved while few of the old ones lost their lives. The answer for this strange incident was later discovered. The old men, who were much more experienced, were able to face and withstand the difficulties in the environment. They were wise to make use of the things where necessary. Eventually, the Outward Bound School was set up in order to provide the younger generations more experience.

The syllabus of the course was carried out both at sea and on land. However, for the first week, there was physical training to make the trainees fit for the actual training that was to be followed. We did cross country run, hiking and simple actions, like those we did in P.E. lessons, but they were much harder. For the first few times, most of us felt exhausted and were just driven to exhaustion by the instructors mercilessly. "The harder you do, the greater is the effect!" They shouted and encouraged us. Soon the lads all looked fit and turned brown. At dusk, after one whole day's exercise, everyone was simply tired out. We were allowed to swim at the shore if we still got strength.

Sailing and canoeing were the main activities at sea. There were not more than two voyages for each because of the short training period. Each trip occupied two to three days during the course. Of these two, sailing was comparatively more difficult as far as I was concerned. The main reason was that I got seasick when the sea was very rough. We had to row when there was no wind. How-

ever, the long oars were too heavy for most of us, few of us could manage them well throughout the voyage. Very often, the oars were just dipped into the water and then up again straight away, till eventually the boat was absolutely stationary. It often reminded me of the Roman slaves. In fact, the technique and skill in sailing was not taught. This meant that we were required to observe.

As for land activities, they were more exciting. There was a "rope course" in the school. Its aim was to train everyone to be courageous. Some of us got hurt because some were scared while others were careless and a bit clumsy. In this "rope course", we were required to climb rope ladders, swinging with ropes, doing the monkey climb, etc.

Rock climbing was another challenging event for us. It took place at Kowloon Peak which is suitable for rock climbing activities. It was very exciting for we beginners. However, our instructor, who is an expert from England, paid no attention to the exciting act when he lifted himself up the rocks vertically without any safety measure. We practised how to descend too at the Suicide Wall. It still seemed unbelievable after we had done this sort of climbing! There was a member in our group who appeared to be a nervous man. He used a much, much longer period to climb each rock for he was scared and frightened very much. Every new and then, he paused and did not know how to proceed.

Despite the disaster in which two trainees were struck by lightning during the 5th course, the school is proved to be a success in Hong Kong. The Old Boys' Association was established by the students in an attempt to recall the bygone days of the exciting training. On the other hand, there were only six to eight pupils out of the fourty-eight trainees in our course. However, there are fifteen of us who will attend the course this summer!

#### THE MA WAN AFFILIATION PROJECT

We were happy to take over the Ma Wan Affiliation Project which was started last year as our civics project. We follow much the same plan of work in the previous year but try to make any possible improvement if we can.

All the children are energetic, bright and happy, though the girls of the upper class are a bit shy and timid. We often admire their way of playing and their cheerful spirits. Indeed, we become very close friends after the six visits to Ma Wan.



### FOLK & POP & GUITAR



By now we can see that the melodies of folk music have penetrated into the hearts of millions of people. It is the oldest music we know-but difficult for us to trace its origin. It is the music that has come into our civilization but cannot be assigned to any known composer and a specific period. The melodies and lyrics of folk music have been passed orally from one generation to another, and such tradition is really a special feature in distinguishing folk music from any other music. Sincerity is an important element in folk music and and it is largely the reason why the singing of folk songs is so popular today. In early lyrical instance, a folk singer offers you something more than simple amusement. He gives you a chance to share his emotion and leads you to happiness, or sometimes sorrow.

Up to this very century, the virtues of folk music though still possessed, the current has changed. For today's folk artists besides singing the tarditional ballads, begin to have the desire of writing folk songs and to create new styles of their own. They sing their own compositions and the compositions of their comtemporaries. Anti-war, protest against social coils and love are poular themes for today's folk songs and it is most pleasing to see such a trend, for these songs go deep and live in our society, in an honest way with neither exaggeration nor sophistication. The many outstanding American folk artists in this century include Bob Dylan; Pete Seeger; Peter, Paul & Mary; Odetta; Judy Collins and some others. They have their own talent and taste, but it is impossible for them to deny that they have gained much from

the traditional ballads.

The intrusion of pop music in the previous decade astonished every music critic. Simple tune, heavy beat and hot accompaniment make up every pop song but these three things are sufficient to create a mania in the youngsters' music circle. They form bands, amateur or professional, they sing and they shout. It seems that once they submit themselves to the beat, they can forget all the earthly worries-and the coming of the Beatles augments such mania. Some people (old ones, may be) grumble at pop music denouncing that such light trashy music appeals to the base in man and brings out animalism and vulgarity. They further criticise that its existence can easily intoxicate and demoralize the younger generation. Such prejudice does not all affect the popularity of pop music, for it is a current, it comes when it is time for it to come and it goes when it is time for it to go.

Now the former fabulous four Beatles have disbanded and each one goes his own way. The name, 'Beatles', can only be put into pop music history, though it will be burried forever in the hearts of millions of fans. The exhaustion of the

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pop cycle, besides the spilt of the Beatles, is once again symbolized by the recent deaths of two of its great personalities, Jimi Hendrix and Janis Joplin. The present pop cycle is apparently dying but the next music trend has not yet been born. Now the Beatles have gone, Hendrix has gone, Joplin has gone and whether the mania is going to be gone, we shall see.

The talking of folk and pop music seems meaningless without guitars, either accoustic or electric. The magic hidden under the six strings of a guitar is far too sufficient to make you fancy. It is easy to learn-to be ensured by Mitch Miller, who says, "You can make recognizable sounds on it in a short time. Learn five or six chords and you're performing in public". Unlike a piano it is portable weighing less than a freshborn baby, and most important of all, the cost is not high. That

is why it is one of the best-selling musical instruments in the world. Today, if you pick up a guitar, play a tune and sing a song, it is almost impossible not to find an audience. The many great folk personalities find they can 'protes' more effectively with guitar accompaniment. The pop music bands, even the Beatles, are unthinkable without it. Its popularity stands firm and is regarded as the prevailing sound in today's music.

The guitar is something intensely personal. Once you possess it, you will find there is no obstacle between this instrument and your heart—may be only the layer of skin on your finger tips. Therefore if you possess one, do not miss the joy, sing along with it, or shout—it does not matter.



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

### "BEAUTIFUL CAR, UGLY GIRL"



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
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### REJUVENATION

Dear Editor,

..... As old boys now, we deem it our obligation to write something to the School Magazine, share with all of you our experiences, and tell you what we have learnt during our seven years' stay here. This article, we hope, would at least arouse some interest in all of you about the problems of the extracurricular activites by which the school is characterized.......

"The school has a wide programme of extracurricular activities ranging from sports and games to stamp-collecting, from dramatics to astronomy, from music to chess. Students play an important part in the running of these activities, but without the enthusiasm of the teachers and their willingness to give up a great deal of their time, this important side of school life would not be so successful."

Really, Queen Elizabeth School is a school famous for her extra-curricular activities. The student organizations could be grouped into three main fields—the prefects, house systems and the Club Chairmen Association which seem to have gone stagnant in the recent years. A lot of drawbacks and shortcomings in these three organizations are revealed.

### THE PREFECTS

The prefects are expected to help the school "to remind students of the school rules, to encourage them to make a positive contribution to the corporated life of the school, and to serve as a link between the school authority and the students?" They also represent the students in external affairs.

It is most unfortunate that the prefects are becoming detached from their fellow students who elect them. Always the same group of people, with at least apparently promising ability and popularity, are elected to be prefects from Form 4 to Upper 6. Thus a hierarchy of prefects developed.

Owing to the lack of communication and coordination, the work of the prefects is rarely known or taken notice of by other students. The only ways of contact appear to be a small letter-box placed under the Prefect's Bulletin in a forgotten corner of the covered playground; and through 'trials' in the Prefects' Council The only duties of the prefects, as observed by most students, seemed to be standing in staircases like "doorposts" or chasing students out of their classrooms. For the higher forms, the students could still voice their opinions to the prefects who are their fellow classmates. For the lower forms, the only contact appears to be the Prefect's Council. There is practically no channel for them to express their feelings to the prefects.

More activities on a whole-school basis, such as The English Campaign, the New Year Ball, or the Combined Programmes, should be initiated by the prefects. This would make the prefects' influence felt and to create the conviction in all that they are the representatives of all students. Better propaganda should be made to reveal their broad scope of work which far exceeds that of "doorposts". They are not policemen established to govern the conduct of their fellow students, but a student organisation to promote and keep self-discipline among the students themselves

without the intervention of the school authority, to lead and organize the students themselves in many extracurricular activities.

### THE HOUSE SYSTEMS

The original aims of the house systems are for the students from different forms and classes to group together and organise themselves for functions and activities mostly in the form of competitions. However, such aims are rarely achieved.

It is a deplorable fact that the house ceases to exist as a whole body particularly in the recent years. House activities were confined to a small group of people under the direction of the house captains. Only those who are active and more able have the real chance of participation. The rest is thus deprived of the chance. There is general apathy among most of the house members (note the attendance at the house election general meeting). Most of them think they are only wanted in the times of Sports Day or Swimming Gala. The "house spirit" is the lowest in the upper forms. House parties were held in the Art Room and not the Hall owing to the small number of attendance.

The reasons for the failure of the house system are manifold,

First, the house captain is usually busy in other activities. He could only afford to keep up with 'traditional' work such as Sports Day or Swimming Gala rather than to innovate or reform his house. Furthermore there is not enough coordination between the house masters and house captains; the old and new house captains; and among the house captains themselves. In fact, the new house captains could get acquainted with his work in shorter time if he could learn from the old house captains. Better co-ordination among the four house captains themselves could help to make joint-house activities more successful.

Secondly, even the house committee is not functioning. The house captains usually act without consulting the committee while the officials remain uninformed of how the house is going on.

Thirdly, contact between house members is poor. As general meetings of a house are seldom held, the class representative system provides the only form of communication and it can share a lot of the work of the house captains. But there is not enough contact even between the house captains and class representatives.

Poor preparation and propaganda of the activities also account for the general apathy of the house members. A house member only knew a certain competition had taken place when the results were announced in the assembly. In fact, they were also never told, since their entry into the school, the use of the house.

### **CLUB CHAIRMEN ASSOCIATION**

Though the Club Chairmen Association (CCA) was established three years ago, it is still not known by many students and teachers. CCA was founded in the light of chaos of club activities in the school. Out of the thirty clubs, a number of them have such a small membership that the value of heir existence is doubtful. Secondly the irregular attendance and indifference of the members greatly hampered the original plans of many clubs and frustrated the originally enthusiastic and eager chairmen and club officials. The old problem of one person holding too many important posts also came into being.

Furthermore there were a total lack of coordination among the clubs themselves; among the club chairmen, house captains and perfects; the club chairmen and teachers-in-charge; and the club chairmen and the members.

The aims of the CCA, as stated in the constitution, are to consolidate the club activities of the school, to improve co-ordination among various clubs, to make sure that the officials of various clubs do their part well, to arouse a sense of responsibility among the students, and to co-ordinate with the house captains and prefects in organising various activities. In the past three years, it did try to improve the quality of the club activities by checking more strictly on membership and attendance; by limiting the number of posts one can hold; by giving advice to the various clubs in need and many others.

It is not an easy task at all for the CCA to deal with all these problems, many of which are deeprooted and traditional. There is still plenty of work for the CCA to do.

The CCA's power given in the constitution

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should be fully utilized. For instance, new clubs are still set up at random, without fully considering their real necessity and prospects. The CCA should be consulted first to investigate whether the new club is worth-existing. It is quality, and not quantity, that counts. For instance, the Physics, Chemistry, Biology, and Astronomy clubs could be changed into merely sections of the Science Society under one chairman.

Though matters should not become too institutionalised in secondary schools, some sort of consititutional limitation should be set in clubs. Provisions for the vote of non-confidence and rules governing the election of club officials in general meetings should be set up in a constitution which is applicable to all clubs.

Moreover, many clubs suffer from the shortage of money. The executive committee should have advisory function to the school in the allocation of money to the clubs.

The co-ordination and co-operation between the chairmen and teachers-in-charge could also be bettered. It is fortunate that so many teachers of the school devote so much time in promoting the extracurricular activities of the school. However, there is the tendency that club activities are dominated instead of being planned and run by students and students are left alone without knowing what to do. It must be stressed that constant advice and encouragement from the teachers-in-charge is important in keeping up the enthusiasm of the club officials and members.

Better co-operation and co-ordination among the club chairmen themselves are necessary. The function of the CCA or the executive committee is to give advice to the clubs in need of help and should not interfere with the autonomy of the individual clubs. In case there was an irresponsible chairman, there was very little that the CCA or executive committee could do about it.

The CCA could share the burden of the prefects by acting as a central body in distributing and organizing work such as the post-examination activities. Such central-organized activities would give the club chairmen a chance to work together for the whole school.

### MAIN PROBLEMS

Generally speaking, there are three main problems as a whole. They are: the forming of a group of specially important students, the general apathy from a large number of students, and the lack of co-ordination among the various activities.

The numerous activities in the school need numerous leaders and officials—there are 30 prefects (plus 16 assistant prefects), 8 house captains, over 100 house officials, over 30 club chairmen, and over 100 club officials. Inadequate participation and lack of experienced people have inevitably forced the few persons, of apparently promising ability and leadership, to hold many important posts. He would be either too busy to pay enough attention to his work or too busy to work after having consulted his committee. The passive way to remedy this situation is to limit the number of posts one can hold while the active way is to start the more effective training of lower form students, especially those of Form Four. The activities could be more effectively led if the leaders had acquired experience in the earlier years and not Form Six and if they could share the experience of the 'veterans'.

Contrary to this, a large proportion of the students is inactive and apathetic. A survey conducted by the School Magazine two years ago revealed that about 40% of F.5 and F.6 students joined no activities at all. A lot of faces tended to turn up at 8:30 in the morning and disappeared immediately after the bell rung at 3:30. A major reason of this indifference is the lack of channel of communication among the officials and students, especially those students of lower forms. No one has told them what the houses and prefects are for ever since they entered the secondary school, while some completely miss what extracurricular activities have to offer.

Thirdly, there is virtually no co-ordination among the various activities—the prefects, house captains and club chairmen are all a working on their own. Some sort of central body is necessary to consolidate and improve all the activities, and to promote the full co-operation of the prefects, houses and CCA.

### A STUDENT UNION

A central body, the Students' Association or Union, with all students as its members, is really necessary in the school. A council could be formed from all the prefects, house captains, club chairmen and one representative from each class. The office-bearers of the Association or Union could be elected among members of the Council. In fact, the rudimentary form of such organization was found in the Fair and Bazaar Ad Hoc Committee two years ago. It revealed the fact that when a large-scale function was to be organized, the cooperation of the whole school is a necessity to make it a success. The task at present is urgent and necessary—the REJUVENATION of extra-curricular activities.

By the establishment of a central organization, the activities could be consolidated and better coordinated. The Association or Union could initiate plans for the orientation of newcomers to the school and the training of leaders of lower forms. By the involvement of class representatives in the Council, the lower forms could have their voices heard more loudly and effectively. As a central body, the Association or Union could efficiently distribute work to its sub-organizations internally and represents all the students externally. It would faciliate work of the school authority, the staff and the students. Changes are urgently needed.

One cannot help recalling what Mr. Hinton said two years ago at the Annual Speech Day—"You are, all of you, fortunate in being members of a very active and progressive school, a school which gives you not only the opportunity to achieve academic success under the guidance of capable and devoted teachers but also the chance of developing talents and abilities outside the purely academic sphere. Furthermore, you are given the opportunity not only of participating in many activities—social service, camping, drama, games and so on—but also of leading them, running them yourselves instead of simply following instructions given by your teachers." IT IS UP TO YOU TO MAKE USE OF THIS OPPORTUNITY.

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### LETTERS FROM OLD STUDENTS

Hi, Q.E.S. students,

You hardly know me, but that doesn't matter, for I don't know you personally either. What I know is that you are Q.E.S. students and I was one, and isn't that enough?

Looking back at my student days, I could see myself walking with a heavysch ool bag in hand up the slope leading to our school one morning in September, 1960. And then 7 years later I walked down the same slope a very different person, one who had learnt a fair amount of things under the sheltered milieu of the school. I consider myself very fortunate to be able to learn from our Principal, many of the teachers and fellow-students of the school. One word of advice to you students: make the best out of your stay in Q.E.S. and catch every opportunity for learning. Besides attending to your lessons, join one or two

extracurricular activities because you need to be equipped with as many kinds of skill as possible when you leave school.

I was quite attached to the school in 1967, but I had to go to make way for junior students. This is life. When you have reached the end of a stage, you have to go to the next; stagnation is unhealthy.

I was not prepared to go into the society then, and was only too glad when the H.K. University accepted me as a student of Social Sciences. There through my contacts with hall-mates, fellow students, tutors, lecturers, professors and people outside the University, I became more aware of the environment around me, the society in which we live, the problems facing other people and myself, etc. I began to contemplate.

I agree with some who believe that one of the

functions of a university is to stimulate the students to ask questions again, as many of them might have already forgotten how to do so once they left kindergarten. The ability to ask when in doubt constitutes an important factor in the learning process. To think of it, I realise that I have not asked enough questions in Q.E.S Maybe I was too lazy and did not take my studies too seriously. Perhaps I dare not challenge my teachers, perhaps the teachers had not challenged me sufficiently, perhaps there was not enough stimulation....., but anyway, I see myself making the mistake of accepting the lessons too easily. Here I shall give you another piece of advice: ask when in doubt, and never be too shy to do so. You might have thought that you are the only one in class who do not know, but you'll be surprised to find that in fact many share your doubt, but they have not got the initiative or the 'guts' to raise questions. A good teacher would always welcome questions; asking questions would bring you one step closer to the answers. For example if you want to know more about the Social Sciences Faculty of H.K.U., you could write to the Social Sciences Society, a student body, for information which would give you some idea of the nature of the subjects to enable you to make your choice if you are interested in becoming a student there.

During my stay in the University, I took Sociology, Economics, Psychology and Statistics in my 1st year, Sociology, Social Work and Statistics in my 2nd year, Sociology and Social Work in my final year. I very much enjoyed my university life, with its happiness, excitement, frustration, bitterness, argumentativeness, freedom, responsibility, youthfulness......

The University is a small society in itself, but

it is a more complex one when compared with Q.E.S. Going through the 3 years of university studies, I was better equipped and prepared to step into the bigger society than I had been in 1967. I have become a social worker and continue to learn about the job. My daily duties are concerned with helping people in need. I always keep reminding myself that I must help them to help themselves in order not to create dependency. My past experience in life, including those I have had in Q.E.S., blends together to give me support and confidence in dealing with situations and people whom I come across during the course of my work. I feel great gratitude to all those who had helped me in this respect.

I think I must stop now; it is getting late and I have to get up early to-morrow to go to work. But before I say good-bye, I will again urge you to enjoy yourself in Q.E.S., make the best out of it, try actively to gain knowledge instead of being passively spoon-fed. Establish friendship among the schoolmates and you may be endowed with a few life-long friends. Even when vou've left school, you'll be frequently reminded of the Q.E.S. spirit because you are bound to meet past graduates one way or the other. The other day when I brought one of my clients to a Births and Deaths Registry, a young man with a familiar face asked if I was from Q.E.S. and when I affirmed him that I was, we talked like old friends about our mother school even before exchanging our names!

Dear brothers & sisters of Q.E.S.,

Thanks for the great concern you have for me. Finally I have decided to write even though it is garbage.

This is my second year in Chemical Engineering at the University of Denver. It has a total enrollment of 10,000 but my engineering school has just about 400. You probably have heard about the Great Rockies and here I am, right at the Mountain foot, in the city called 'Denver', which is the capital of Colorado State. "The Mile-High City" is her popular name and that is why during my first day at the Chemistry laboratory, I watched the water boil at 94°C.

In last year's School Magazine, there was a great increase in the number of articles contributed by the old students. Since some of them have told you about what studying is like here, I shall not spend any more time writing about it. In short, it is both tough and challenging. Some find it very rewarding but some just end up in frustation. It all depends on what attitude you have towards your subject of study and how hard you have tried ro persue your goal. Of course, a good university makes a great difference too.

The realization of the importance of petroleum and its by-products early in this century saw the boom in chemical industry. Briefly it includes the manufacture of lady's cosmetics and perfume,

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drugs and chemicals, plastics and fabrics, processed foods and fertilizers, textile and petroleum. Recently the rising concern for pollution control has been a very hot issue in countries around the world. Toxic smoke and gases coming out from the chemical plants and automobiles, and the contamination of water sources impose great threats to human health. 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### THE ARTS FACULTY OF H.K.U.

Dear Friends,

There have been a number of articles written about the university life as an arts student in H.K.U. But actually many as I did, know little about the faculty and its curriculum,

First of all, exams and holidays. It takes three years to get a B.A. degree. What interests arts students most is that there are only two exams within the three years of study: the first year promotional exam and the third year final exam. As in the other faculties, school year is on a three-term basis. Usually, university starts its first term in October and ends its third term in May. Each term takes about two months, with a one-month holiday in between.

Under the faculty of arts are a number of departments. It includes the departments of English, Chinese, History, Georgaphy, Philosophy, European language and Literature, Mathematics, Political Science and Psychology. A first year student has to take four courses: English language and three other courses selected from those offered by the departments and the Language Centre. If he has gained Grade D or above in the Paper 'Use of English' he may if he wishes, claim exemption from English language and choose a fourth course. The second and third years of the curriculum consist either of eight courses in one subject or of four

courses in each of two subjects. Therefore you have to bear in mind the subjects you want to study in the second and third year when you choose your first year courses, since these combination of courses need prerequisites.

Teaching is done by lectures, seminars and tutorials, and laboratory or other practical work. Each lecture or tutorial takes about an hour. For a first year arts student, there will not be more than twenty lessons a week, including the P.E. lessons which are not compulsory. It all depends on the courses you take. Tutorials are small discussional groups led by a tutor. There are usually four to five and not more than ten students in a group.

In addition to the courses in English language for first-year students in the arts Faculty (Science students can also take this course), the Language Centre also provides beginners' and more advanced courses in French and German, and courses in German for engineers and chemists. The Centre has language laboratories open to all students who wish to use them.

Quite unlike the law and medical undergraduates, arts sutdents are not trained to be professionals or specialists for certain jobs. It seems that an arts graduate is qualified for every field of work but actually proficient or specialized in none of them. Arts is a human science. Apart from the curriculum, three years of university edu-

cation also provide a everybody a chance to work together, organising social and group activities.

This is intended to be a very imformative and factual article. I did not write much about my impression of the university life as an arts student partly because I do not wish to preimpose my own views on others, and partly because I am still a

freshman and is in no position to make any definite sound evaluation of the University. But one thing I am for sure: enjoy as much as possible your university life once you get into it. Enjoy your school life in Q.E.S. now. It's invaluable!

## THE ENGINEERING DEPARTMENT AT H.K.U.

To speak the truth, I have not written anything of such length since my Matriculation Examination. I am now writing this article specially for the information of those of you who are studying science, and who intend to enter the Department of Engineering at H.K.U., this summer or next. I am not exaggerating, and what I am telling you is simply what I experienced, and what, to my belief, you will meet in the near future.

As we all know, there are three branches in engineering, viz, Electrical Engineering (EE), Mechanical Engineering (ME) & Civil Engineering (CE), excluding those that are only in the planning stage. Each curriculum lasts three years; that is about a total of 18 working months. You may think it too short for you, with only 6 months out of every twelve, when you have been accustomed to 10 months a year right here at QES. But I tell you it is not really so, since part of the so-called nonworking months Are working months if you want to get out of the University after 3 years (not 1 or 2 or 4), with a degree, of course. In the first year you have to get used to the new environment, new friends, new methods of teaching and studying, and a thousand other new things. In the second year you would have to catch up what you missed in the first; and needless to say, the third year is the really hard year, during which you have to prepare for the final degree examination.

What I have been saying, so far, seems to concern all departments of HKU in general. So let us now focus our attention to the Engineering Department in particular. Everybody, whether he will be the future electrical or mechanical or civil engineer, will have to study almost the same curriculum in the first year. This includes eight compulsory subjects, namely Fluid Mechanics, Applied Electricity, Applied Mechanics, Mathematics, Applied Mechanics, Mathematics, Applied thermodynamics, Properties of Materials, Engineering Drawing and one for that particular curriculum (i.e., EE, ME or CE). Most freshmen find Properties of Materials and Applied thermodynamics the most difficult to deal with at the beginning. Not only that the subjects are themselves not easy, but also the situation is worsened by the way the lectures are given. Lectures are given according to the lecturer's own theory derived from his own experimental results, which you cannot find in any book on sale. Of course you can look up his research papers for reference, but that is at a level too advanced for you. So, mind you, try to sit in the front of the lecture room during lectures and listen carefully to what lecturers have to say,

Then, all the other subjects will take care of themselves except Applied Electricity, Applied Mechanics and Engineering Drawing, which deserve a remark or two. Be careful with Applied Electricity, because, as a rule, quite a number of students fail in this subject every year. Finally, technical drawing is a peculiar subject. If you are studying electrical engineering, you have to study it only for half a year. If you get passed in the Midsessional test held in December of the first year, you don't have to study it for the rest of your life, as professional engineers don't draw and it is sufficient that you can read the drawings worked out by craftsmen. Although the future

mechanical and civil engineers have to study drawing even in the second year, they too have to pass this test. So, my fellow schoolmates, try to get a pass in this test by all means.

Now a word about the choice of the curriculum. I know that most successful matriculants who have decided to enter into engineering will waver between the 3 branches. Indeed, it IS difficult to choose the proper department. However, let me assure you, there is no department with a particularly high academic standard. If there is, it is just because of the greater number of applicants in that department that year, and no one knows beforehand which department it is. So, considering the future, I think it more appropriate to apply for the branch you are most interested in. Among the three branches, EE requires a relatively good basis of mathematics and is a good choice for those interested in electronics, telecommunication, or computer technology as well as those who like power generation and transmission. ME requires better skills in drawing and workshop techniques, and is the subject for those whose interests are in metalwork, steam engines or aerodynamics. Finally, if you are less ambitious and is satisfied with a well-paid and stable job with the Government, as an engineer at PWD or HKWW, or as a traffic engineer, then CE is the subject for you.

Finally, a word of warning. There is great competition in the three branches. You will find schoolmates a dozen times more intelligent than you, or a dozen times more diligent, or possessing both qualities at the same time. In our year, there is a student who has studied for 3 whole years at the Technical College before entering HKU, and many who have studied for 1 or 2 years there. But don't be afraid of them. If you can enter HKU, you can certainly beat them, academically or otherwise.

Lastly, starting from the year 1970-1971, there are female students in these three branches of engineering; so, for girls, you've also got a chance to study to become a woman engineer, and for boys, you've got a chance to study with woman engineers-to-be.

As he slowly walked up the slope towards his mother school he was a bit scared. He met some of his schoolmates in the covered playground. They were surprised at his arrival. He knew they were shocked sav

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ed by the way they stared at him.

When the lessons of that very day was over, he saw teachers and students rushing out from the classrooms, he then realised there was quite a change in his mother school-most of the teachers were new to him. The kids from Lower Forms changed a lot as well. Before he left, they were charming and active, boys were shy in front of girls. But now these kids had grown up to young, tall fellows with long hair and bell-bottomed pants. They began to know how to dress themselves up in order to catch girls' attention. By looking at them, he could find his past image back again. All he could feel now was the warmth from his classmates. They had a chat in a resturant nearby. They knew exactly how his feelings were at this stage. They tried to make him happy again; and asked him to come to their class picnic. He felt grateful about it and promised to go.

of time to think. ### 2. Form Associations

At present moment we have already got three Form Associations. They are the 1968, 1969 and 1970 graduates. They help much in the communications between the new and old members of the Associations.

We are planning to form the 1971 Form Association this August, and we hope that these Form Associations will continue their effort to assist the Old Students' Association in every aspect.

### 3. Student Loan Fund Committee

A Student Loan Fund Committee was formed in October, 1970 by a group of old students. The purpose of it is to give financial assistance to needy Q.E.S. students for furthering their studies in the University or Technical College. Current Q.E.S. students who need assistance in Examination fees, book fees and temporary emergency relief can also be qualified for assistance under this scheme.

It is anticipated that the fund raising campaign will be held in June this year. The initial target is around H.K.\$50,000.00. Applications will be open in August. It is intended to distribute the funds collected to selected applicants primarily in the form of loans so that it can perpetuate itself once repayment starts to stream back. Further details will be communicated to Q.E.S. students at a later stage.

### 4. Electronic Sound Equipment

A new set of electronic sound production system was bought for the porpose of assisting O.S.A. further activities, e.g. parties, drama, concerts etc.... The whole system is also available on hire to members of various clubs of Q.E.S. under the regulations passed by the Executive Committee.

### 5. Activities

Christmas Party—It was held on the 24th December, 1970. Around 500 people attended. The atmosphere was well controlled. The excellent sound effect produced by the electronic sound producing system added success to the night. Various prizes were donated by Mr. Tong Wai Ki, our former president.

Lunar Year Dance—It was held on 28.1.1971. Around 400 people attended. They all had a joyful evening.

Barn Dance—We are considering holding a barn dance in June, 1971. Further details will be given to all members later.

Welcome Party—There will be a welcome party to the new members in mid-July, 1971. New members are encouraged to come. Details will be posted up later.

Dear Sir,

The air mail of 30th November, 1970 had long been received. Feeling lazy and with distrust of my not-worth-mentioning experience, I didn't make any effort to do any thing about it. Until I receive the little Christmas card just after the post strike, I am deeply touched and feel obliged to write something.

Last week I read through the book written by Dr. Z.S. Horn, 'AWAY WITH ALL PESTS'. It is about his experience as a surgeon in China and the book may be already well-known in Hong Kong. However, this book was bought after the brief lecture by Dr. Horn when he visited Newcastle Medical School. When I showed the book to my Chinese folks, they seemed to be surprised at the photos, otherwise, they chose to talk about something else.

To me, this book leaves me a mixture of feelings.

I am now a first-year medical student. After five years' training, I may graduate as a doctor. Thinking about my prospect and my future, I couldn't help pointing my nose up into the air and feel superior to others. Yet after reading about the peasant doctors and their attitudes to the patients and so on, I discover my ego is really another sort of vanity, selfishness with too much superiority complex. What a doctor should do is to serve the interests of the patients, not to serve money, reputation or fame. I hope other youngsters will also correct their thinking of the university as the key to wealth. Money isn't everything.

In our medical course for MBBS, there are 100 students in the first year. The students are not very bright as I expected. It is just a cross-section of any student population. Of course there are very brilliant students but on the whole, their intelligence, just like mine, can be classed as average. As our Dean said, "Medicine is ever the best profession for any person with average intelligence."

Medicine is the best faculty in any university. The tradition persists longer than other faculties. Not until last year, the students attending the lectures do not have to put on their black gowns. The midical course is very well planned. We have different sets of time table in the beginning of term such as Anatomy and Physiology may be interlaced with one another.

Lastly, if there is any question about Newcastle University, I'll be glad to try to solve it.
